The Battalion received third place in overall competition and first place in the advertising division at the Southwestern Journalism Congress conference held last weekend at Texas Tech University. The University of Texas at Austin won first place in overall competition, and second place went to

the University of Texas at Arlington. The Daily Oklahoman at the University of Oklahoma received the Best Newspaper award, followed by the North Texas Daily at North Texas State University and The Daily Texan at the University of Texas at Austin. Dillard Stone, editor of The Battalion, won first place in editorials,

first place in editorial page layout and second place in headlines. Lee Roy Leshper, a graduate student in marketing, placed first in spot news photography. Leshper also earned second place for a magazine advertisement. A series of ads by Regina Moehlman, senior, received a first place award. Moehlman also won second and third place in co-op advertising and second place for a single ad.

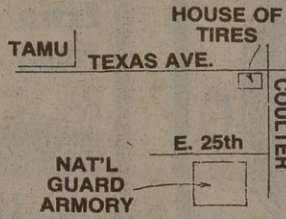

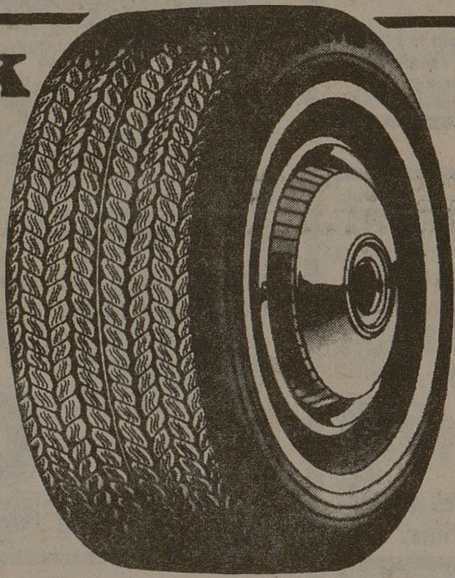

## Activities scheduled for seniors

The Spring Induction Banquet of the Association of Former Students on April 13-14 will be the first of several senior activities scheduled for the next few weeks. The induction banquet is open to all May and August graduates and the Class of '81 agents will be elected at that time. There will be a separate banquet for fall graduates.

"We're expecting 1,800 students to attend the banquet," said Kathy Dockweiler, secretary in the Association of Former Students. "There should be around 900 each night."

"Because of an increase in the number expected (up from 1,400 students inducted last year), in future years we may have to go to third night."

Tickets may be picked up April 6-10 in the Forsyth Alumni Center lobby. Only one ticket will be available per graduating senior.

"The purpose of the banquet is to acquaint students with the benefits offered the former students," said Tommie Sorenson, administrative assistant for the Association of Former Students. "We do this to impress the students and make them realize how important they are to the University."

The next social event for seniors will be the annual senior bash at Lakeview featuring Dennis Lee and the Waymen. Tickets are \$4 per couple.

The senior banquet and Ring Dance will be May 2. Two Houston bands will provide entertainment for the dance. Ed Gerlach's 20-piece orchestra will be in the Memorial Student Center Ballroom and Doppelganger, a popular music group, will be in Rudder Exhibit Hall.

Picture-taking will begin at 4:30 p.m. in the MSC lounge, and the dance will start at 9 p.m. Tickets for the Ring Dance are \$15 per couple, \$10 per couple for the banquet.

## 4 graduate offices still open

Elections are over, but not in the offices are filled.

Four positions in the Graduate Student Council—two in the College of Geosciences and two in the College of Liberal Arts—were left vacant after all regular election returns were tabulated and certified late Monday night.

Votes of graduating seniors, who voted in a special election Monday, were merged with underclassmen's votes collected March 31 and April 1.

Former GSC president Andrew Johnson said Tuesday the two vacancies will be filled by graduates who apply to the GSC sometime during either the summer or early in the fall semester—"depending on what the new president decides."

The GSC will then review the applications and make a choice, he said.

Several other positions, all of them graduate student slots, would have been left open were not for the write-in process. Names of candidates not on the printed ballot were written on the back of the computer grading sheet used to vote.

The most votes cast for any graduate student position was 22, most candidates got less than ten votes, and many got only one.

Several winners—again of graduate races—were strictly write-in candidates, some with as few as two votes and one with only one vote.

"Grad students just don't participate in elections that much," Johnson said, "and don't get involved in that many activities. A lot of them (write-in winners) don't ever serve. They find out what they have to do and resign because they really just wanted to see it on their resume anyway."

## 'Quincy' skips a day, faces suit
