A printing error in the Texas A&M spring calendar repeats the Monday exam schedule for every day of finals week, May 11 to 15.

The correct exam schedule appears in the monthly calendar of April, which includes the first two weeks of May and on page 8 of the Spring Class Schedule 1981 booklet, said Don Albrecht, assistant director for student activities.

"When we took the calendar to the Printing Center, Monday's schedule got picked up five times instead of once by the word processor," Albrecht said. "Several people missed the mistake and it just got through us."

Albrecht said about 27,000 of the free calendars, which are funded by MSC Bookstore profits, were printed and all were distributed. But, the calendars were not reprinted because the University also publishes monthly calendars.

About 8,000 monthly calendars

were printed and distributed, he said.

Albrecht said the exam schedule is fairly consistent from semester to semester, but he said it might change because of variations in night class scheduling.

University Regulations says a student may request a change from the final exam schedule only if he has three exams scheduled for the same day.

Albrecht also said "common

sense situations" could call for a change.

However, University Regulations provides no allowances for faculty to deviate from the final exam schedule.

No exams, except for optional tests, make-up tests, or tests in courses carrying one credit hour of theory or practice, may be given during dead week, University Regulations says.

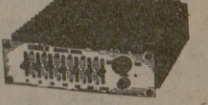
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KAMU exceeds auction goal

KAMU-TV exceeded its goal by more than \$8,000 this year in its annual auction to help raise money for production costs.

This year's goal was \$20,000, said Penny Zent, development director for KAMU. They raised \$28,279 during the auction, which ran Sunday through Thursday.

The station had \$35,000 worth of merchandise to auction off and \$5,500 in underwritings.

"We broke our record of last year on the fourth night," said Mel Chastain, director of educational broadcast services. The TV station raised \$15,677 last year. But, this

year on Thursday night alone, he said, KAMU made \$6,110.

KAMU cannot have commercials because it is a public broadcasting station, Zent said. But it is allowed to mention on the air those businesses that donate money for production cost.

These underwritings for the auction totaled \$5,500, Chastain said.

Items ranged in value from \$25 to \$1,200.

The highest bid of \$941 was for a vacation to Disney World for four days and three nights, Zent said. The package, worth \$1,200, included air fare, accommodations at the Royal Plaza Hotel in the

Disney World Village and tickets to Disney World and Sea World.

A vacation to Hot Springs, Ark., was also up for bids and included three days and two nights at the Arlington Hotel in Hot Springs with tickets to Magic Springs, an amusement park.

Other items auctioned included a dinner with Head Football Coach Tom Wilson, a dinner with Acting President Charles Samson and his wife, a pinball machine and plants. A chance to sing with Dennis Ivey and the Waymen was also up for sale.

All workers for the auction were volunteers, including the hosts, Zent said. John Henry

Faulk from the television show Hee-Haw hosted one night.

Volunteers from the community who are members of "Friends of KAMU" started working to prepare for the auction at the beginning of the year, Chastain said.

About 80 people helped each night, Chastain said.

Drill teams finish first, second in weekend meet

The Women's Drill Team placed first in arms competition last weekend while the Fish Drill Team placed second in overall competition at a meet held at Texas A&M University.

Forty high school and nine college teams executed their drills Saturday in the Kyle Field parking lot.

The State of Texas Invitational Drill Meet is sponsored by the Association of Former Fish Drill Team Members every year.

The Texas A&M Fish Drill Team placed first in inspection, which is based on the team members' composure and ability to answer questions. The team also placed first in basic drill, the ex-

ecution of a pre-determined set of drills. The team placed second in the free-style exhibition drill. The University of Texas at Arlington team placed first in overall competition.

The women beat one other entry in their division. Both teams will compete at a meet in San Antonio on April 25.

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
