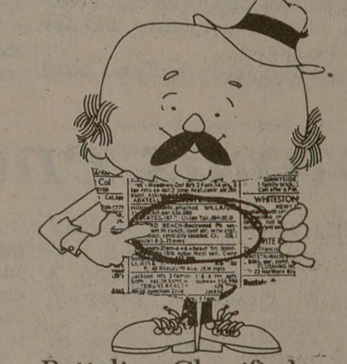

'Super mud' may aid in future oil drilling

LUBBOCK — A Texas Tech University scientist is searching for an alternative energy source that could produce positive results for energy recovery methods — if he is successful in producing a type of "super mud."

Research by Necip Guven, a geosciences professor at Texas Tech, seeks to develop drilling mud that can withstand high temperatures and pressures encountered in drilling thousands of feet into the earth for geothermal energy sources.

Drilling mud is used to cool and lubricate a drill bit and to flush earth shavings cut by the bit to the surface of a well. Muds used in oil and gas exploration break down when used in drilling to great depths.

Oil and gas industry engineers are watching Guven's research with enthusiasm, hoping results also will improve drilling of conventional wells.

Tapping geothermal energy sources, which are derived from the earth's own natural heat, presents special problems for drillers, since their bits must penetrate hot water and steam pockets.

"The temperatures are much higher and the pressures much

greater," Guven said. "The water can be compared to that in a conventional well and steam above it to the natural gas well."

"Conventional fluids are suitable for drilling geothermal wells because of the high temperatures and complex chemistries of the wells, compared with the temperatures and chemistry of gas well."

To overcome special problems associated with probing for geothermal sources, Guven and Lee, a geosciences doctorate student, currently are investigating two fibrous clay minerals: saponite and sepiolite.

Sophisticated laboratory instruments used for studying drilling fluids include a high pressure autoclave to simulate temperatures and pressures, and a meter to test the consistency of experimental fluids.

The autoclave can produce temperatures of more than 800 degrees Fahrenheit and pressures up to 20,000 pounds per square inch, and the viscometer can measure the consistency of fluids at temperatures up to 500 degrees and pressures up to 1,000 pounds per square inch, Guven said.

New theories posed on origin of primate world

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A group of scientists has come up with some new theories about an old evolutionary problem — where did man's ancestral apes and monkeys originate?

In a just-published book, they contend higher primates originated in Asia, migrated to Africa and then made a bizarre journey across a series of islands in the equatorial Atlantic region to South America some 40 million years ago.

Their ideas challenge the classical theory of anthropologists that the earliest higher primates evolved simultaneously in North America and Eurasia and then migrated south into South America and Africa.

It is co-edited by anthropologist Russell Ciochon of the University of North Carolina-Charlotte, and A. Brunetto Chiarelli of the Institute of Anthropology in Florence, Italy. The 528-page book is entitled "Evolutionary Biology of the New World Monkeys and Continental Drift" (Plenum Press of New York) and contains articles by 29 scientists in the fields of anatomy, anthropology, biochemistry, biology and other sciences.

Likely to spark the most controversy is an article by geophysicist D.H. Tarling of the University of Newcastle. It says new evidence has been found in undersea exploration supporting the existence of an island chain between Africa and South America. A second chain, the book claims, may have existed between North and South America.

"What's unique is that it (the book) combines evolution and geology to provide a story of what happened," said Ciochon in an interview. "This is a testable model that combines the biology of the

past and the geology of the present. In addition to the geological evidence, Ciochon said, the book offers biological evidence — "the African primates and South American primates are such remarkable similarities there has to be a link."

Ciochon was among a group of anthropologists who in 1974 announced they had discovered what they hailed as the remains of the oldest living primate. The discovery was made in Burma and dated to about 10 million years ago.

Ciochon's current work is without detractors. Dr. Elwyn L. Simons, director of the Duke University Primate Center, believes monkeys and apes are incapable of making prolonged crossing of a body of water. He ascribes to the classical theory of "parallel evolution" of North America and Eurasia.

"It's a new attempt to maintain the point of view of long-distance water crossing," said Simons. "They have every right to try to do this. I can't make the controversy go away."

"The people who propose these ideas are generally not used to working with living primates. These animals die from starvation in six or seven days."

Ciochon said the recent discovery of evidence was found during exploration underwater magnetic operations. It involved a process by which geologists can determine if the terrain was once above water level, Ciochon said.

He said the pattern of ocean currents also supports his theory that such a voyage would have been possible. In addition, he said, the distance between Africa and South America 40 million years ago was only half of what it is today.
