Former Gov. Daniel says he wants visitation rights

LIBERTY — Former Texas Gov. Price Daniel has asked a court to keep former daughter-in-law Vickie Daniel from turning his grandchildren against him.

Daniel also told State District Judge W.G. Woods the dates he would like to have visitation rights to two grandchildren whose custody was given to Mrs. Daniel by a jury Friday.

Daniel urged in the document

filed Monday an end to the contempt and bitterness "in the presence of the kids" between in-laws feuding over Franklin, 3, and Marion Price "Bob" IV, 1.

Mrs. Daniel, 33, won the custody lawsuit brought by her former sister-in-law, Jean Daniel Murph, following Mrs. Daniel's fatal shooting of former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. Jan. 19.

Mrs. Daniel has said the grand-

parents would be allowed visitation rights.

She has said she shot her husband in self-defense.

Daniel urged the court to keep Mrs. Daniel from influencing the children against other members of the family.

"It is imperative in the best interest of the children that they not be taught to dislike or hate anyone concerned with the possession, access or visitation," Daniel said. "There have been numerous indications that thus far suggestions to that effect have been made to the children by persons in possession of them when they were about to visit their Aunt Jean Daniel Murph and the interveners."

Daniel asked to have the court include in its verdict visitations totaling 61 days a year. Included in his request are four weeks in late July and early August coinciding with the yearly Daniel family reunion and round-up in Liberty.

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Clements criticizes I&R rejection

AUSTIN — Republican Gov. Bill Clements says the Legis-

ture's failure to pass an initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution shows that body is not responding to the will of Texans.

The House voted 86-56 Tuesday for passage of the proposal, but constitutional amendments require 100 votes from the 150-member House and also a two-thirds vote of the 31-member Senate.

"It is unfortunate that a segment of the House of Representatives decided to play games with us," Clements said in a written statement. "Some representatives

tried to get on both sides of the issue by putting forward a 'purist' theory of I&R by 110 votes, then shooting it down."

Clements also said polls indicate a large majority of Texans want initiative and referendum.

The measure, which originally concerned only state taxation and spending, was greatly broadened on a vote of 110-30 to allow citizens to repeal any state statute and also to recall state officials.

The sponsor of the measure, Rep. John Sharp, D-Victoria, said Tuesday's vote kills the issue for this session.

"I always thought that once you

broadened the thing out it was gone," Sharp said. "The House chose to do that and that's the way it went."

Last week the bill was tentatively approved 88-51 and Sharp and Clements had lobbied since then to garner the necessary 100 votes. Clements had made passage of an initiative and referendum amendment a campaign promise.

Several opponents of the measure said it would create a "California situation" under which voters would establish tax ceilings that would hamper school funding.

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
