Rangers take Chisox for 13th win

ARLINGTON — Bill Stein's run-scoring single in the seventh inning snapped a 2-2 tie Wednesday night to lift the Texas Rangers to a 4-2 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

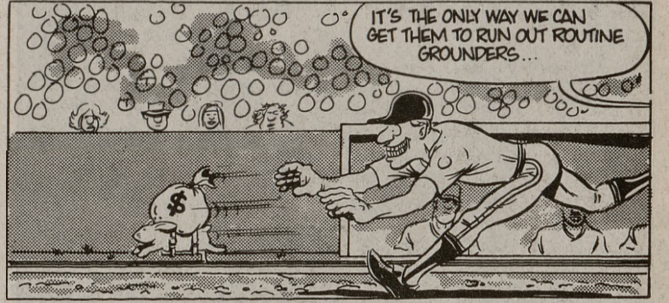
Jim Sundberg led off the seventh with a single and one out later, moved to third on Bump Wills' single. Stein then delivered his RBI single to right field to give the Rangers a 3-2 lead. Al Oliver followed with a fielder's choice grounder that scored Wills to make it 4-2.

John Henry Johnson picked up his second victory against one loss, working 2 2-3 innings of scoreless relief while Chicago starter Britt Burns, 2-2, took the loss.

The Rangers took a 2-0 lead on run-scoring singles by Leon Roberts and John Grubb in the first inning. The White Sox tied the game in the top of the seventh on RBI singles by Lamar Johnson and Bob Molinaro.
