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Vietnam vets protest government's attitude

Families of servicemen killed in war joined relatives of the eight men killed in the Iranian hostage rescue attempt in solemn Memorial Day ceremonies, but Vietnam War veterans protested what they called government neglect.
For those not touched by war, the long weekend seemed an endless stretch of good times.
In Los Angeles, six veterans staging a sit-in at the Wadsworth Veterans Hospital and eight veterans in the 10th day of a hunger strike on the front lawn were joined Monday by hundreds of veterans and movie and stage stars seeking increased federal aid to help Vietnam vets.
"It's important for me to support this effort to try to get these fellows the proper attention," said actor Jon Voight, who won an Oscar for his role as a disabled Vietnam vet in the movie "Coming Home."
"I don't think these guys were supported when they came back because of our doubts and fears."
The group, which included Voight and Mike Farrell of the "M-A-S-H" television series, sang "When Johnny Comes Marching Home" in their march from a nearby veterans' cemetery to the hos-

pital to mourn the unexplained death of James Hopkins, 32, a Vietnam veteran.
Hopkins, claiming he was suffering from exposure to the chemical defoliant Agent Orange, crashed his jeep in the hospital lobby earlier this year and died at his home of undisclosed causes last week.
The veterans said they will continue their protest until President Reagan meets with them or sends an aide to discuss federal aid for Vietnam veterans suffering physical and psychological ailments caused by Agent Orange.
There was no response from Reagan.
Fifteen former hostages presented medals Monday to the families of the eight servicemen killed in the April 1980 aborted rescue attempt in Iran at a ceremony in Washington's Arlington National Cemetery.
"This service is special and unique," said former hostage Lt. Col. David Roeder. "We are here today to witness a children's salute to those fallen Americans. This is a ceremony of honor, not of tears; a ceremony of pride, not of apology."
Each family was presented with a medal, inscribed with the creed

of No Greater Love, the motto that sponsored the ceremony.
"We believe no greater love can be shown than when men and women so live and die that their friends may be free."
Memorial Day services were held in Philadelphia, Vail, Pa.; Hawaii's Pearl Harbor; Detroit; Chicago; Boston; Quincy, Mass., and hundreds of communities across the country.
For many Americans, Memorial Day—originally celebrated to honor those who died in the Civil War—was simply fun.
In suburban Detroit, "space floats" bobbed down Painted Creek in the "Floral Boatables" contest. The floats were homemade rafts made of look like spacecraft.
An estimated 75,000 people gathered on the Capitol steps in Washington Monday night to watch the first concert conducted by Soviet defector Maxim Shostakovich since he left the U.S.S.R.
The eighth annual Dole Jubilee was in full swing in Sacramento, Calif., as was the annual Spoleto Festival U.S.A. in Charleston, S.C. And, some 55,000 people basked in sunshine at the New England Fiddle Contest in Hartford, Conn.

Industry to use land as dump site

DAYTON — Dayton State Bank President Bob Jamison says he never would have negotiated the sale of 1,000 acres of farmland to Rollins Environmental Services if he had known the land was to be used as a dump for toxic chemicals.
Jamison, an heir to the land, was angered because Rollins did not mention what the land would be used for during negotiations leading to the \$3.5 million sale earlier this month, and now he and the townspeople are vowing to block Rollins' plans.
"We did inquire about environmental aspects," Jamison said Monday, "but all (Rollins) said was that anything they would do would be environmentally acceptable."
In a town meeting Monday, an 11-person committee was formed to prevent the site from being used as a disposal for hazardous chemical wastes. If Rollins receives a Class 1 permit from the state, it can dump anything but nuclear wastes on the site.
"We don't want to be the garbage can of the world," a member of the board of the Trinity River Authority, Leard Conner, said.
Rollins Vice President Jerry Neel denied there would be any adverse health problems.
"People won't know that we are out there," he said.
Neel added, "They (Jamison heirs) had no knowledge at all who we were. It was done very secretly. They just knew that a large industry was interested in their property."

About 250 residents attended the meeting.
"We don't want it and will do anything in our power to stop it," said Joe Harris, president of Dayton school board and chairman of the resistance committee.
Rollins was cited in March by the Environmental Protection Agency for violating two regulations for disposing of toxic chemicals at its 85-acre Deer Park site. Earlier this month, the company received 34,000 gallons of chemical which has caused man reproductive systems damage. The chemical, PCB, polychlorinated biphenyls, was disposed of by Rollins.
Conner said he fears the company will be importing chemicals into the site.
"As far as we know, none of it will be coming from Lake County," he said.

28th Atlanta victim found

ATLANTA — A black man whose nude body was found in a suburban Chattahoochee River Sunday was identified today as year-old Nathaniel Cater — the 28th young black to be slain in Atlanta area in the last 22 months.
Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown called a news conference to announce Cater's identity, which was established by fingerprints short time after the body was taken to the morgue.
Police said they withheld the name of Cater, who was never reported missing, to avoid any interference with the effort to trace last movements.
Meanwhile, Ronald Crawford, a missing 22-year-old man whose name was added Monday to the special police task force list, reportedly called his mother late Monday to report that he was working in a peach orchard since July, 1979. One other missing youngster, 10-year-old Darron Glass, remains unaccounted for since dropping from sight last September.
Cater was the 17th of the victims to die of asphyxiation or strangulation and was the oldest, although four of the previous five victims were adults. His body was the sixth to be found in the Chattahoochee river that winds through Atlanta's northern and western suburbs. Three others have been pulled from the South River, south of the city.
Two youths in canoes found Cater's body lying on its right side and only partially submerged about two feet from the south bank with sight of an Interstate 285 bridge across the Chattahoochee.
The site was a few hundred yards from where the body of Jimmy Payne was found in the river April 28.
Other victims whose bodies were found in the Chattahoochee this year include Timothy Hill, 13, Eddie "Bubba" Duncan, 21, and Michael L. McIntosh, 23, who, like Cater, was found dead before he was reported missing.
In addition, the body of Patrick Rogers, 16, was taken from the river in December. Those found in or near the South River were Alan Jackson Jr., 9, Curtis Walker, 13, and Joseph Bell, 15.
Cater's body was discovered 12 days after the last previous victim, William Barrett, 17, was found beside a dead-end road just outside Atlanta's eastern city limits.
Dr. Robert Stivers, the chief Fulton County medical examiner, said Cater, 5-foot-10 and 150 pounds, died of asphyxiation and had been in the river for two days to a week. He said Cater's age also should have given police a better chance of tracking his last movements.
"What happens with these kids is nobody ever knows where they are," he said, "but with adults, they have a work pattern and frequent certain bars so it's easy to trace them."
Cater was the eighth of the 27 victims to be found either nude or wearing only undershorts though police have said no evidence of sexual molestation has been found on any of the bodies.
Stivers said Cater's death "fits the pattern of the rest of them. It's asphyxiation death."
He said there were no obvious wounds visible on the body, but said he found evidence of "neck trauma," possibly indicating the use of a chokehold or other method of strangulation.
"What we've been seeing is hemorrhaging behind the larynx and into the strap muscles," Stivers said.
Stivers said he could not rule out the possibility that the man was a victim of a copycat killer, but he said, "I don't know if anyone would be able to copy it that closely."
