### Fair 'too much trouble'

# No success in Luckenbach

**LUCKENBACH** — There were some disappointments. For instance, the Russian Olympic team didn't show up and one competition was canceled because there were too many toilets.  
Television actor, fair promoter and overall head honcho Guich Koock said he wasn't sure when the next Luckenbach Worlds Fair would be held.  
"It's just too much trouble," he said. "It's going to be awhile before we have the next one."  
The primarily beer drinking, good funning event drew several thousand during the weekend, but Koock was disappointed the Soviets were no-shows. He had them entered in the vodka chugging contest.

Koock said he wasn't sure whether the Russians really declined to come — they just never answered their official invitation.  
Koock did say, however, this years fair — spread over two weekends — seemed more like the first one held in 1969.  
"It just feels more like the first fair than any other we've had," he said, while conceding an important difference.  
"This time we have a lot more bathrooms. We only had two at the first world's fair. That became one of the competitions — to see who could hold out the longest."  
Set on a hilly 10-acre section of a Luckenbach ranch, artists and vendors lined grassy pathways leading to three stages where musicians continuously played a smorgasbord of music from fiddling, or rock and roll to country

banjo.  
The entertainment was interrupted for minutes to allow a young Texas couple, dressed in 19th century costume, to be married on stage.  
One of the key competitive events was "back-door races" staged on four mattresses each with a picture window frame placed feet away. At the sound of a shotgun, contestants — dressed in their underwear — raced to get off the bed, into their pants and out the window.  
Koock said that after the first fair, residents of the tiny town voted that the celebration moved elsewhere.  
Now, however, the city is a ghost town, partially owned by Koock and he brought the
