National Teenager wins beauty title in \$1.48 gown

BURLEY, Idaho — Miss Teenage Idaho won her title wearing a second-hand gown she bought in a church store for \$1.48. The contestant who came in second spent \$450 on her gown.

Andrea Lund, 17, the state's representative at next month's Miss National Teenager Finals in Fort Myers, Fla., spent weeks looking for the right attire in which to compete.

She and her mother, Rallet Lund, made long drives to stores in Boise and Salt Lake City searching for the outfit to best go with her 5-foot-5 height, long brown hair and blue eyes.

"The right dress is very important," the high school senior said. "I looked around for a long time, pricing gowns, and a lot of the expensive ones were very common and not too exciting."

One night Lund was helping her father close up the Deseret Industries store where he works as manager. While Marion Lund finished his evening business at the secondhand store owned by the Mormon Church, his daughter sifted through a rack of old clothes and found one she liked.

"I could tell the dress was pretty much had been looking for, but it would need some get it ready for the pageant," she said.

Lund bought the garment for \$1.48 and home for some intensive redesigning.

She removed the pink bow and the silver sash with delicate white lace, and finished redesigning the gown, she was satisfied the outfit would stand up well under the judge's scrutiny.

"It was breathtaking when it was finished," said. "A lot of the girls had dresses costing \$200, and the first runner-up bought one I guess it shows you can do just about anything let your imagination run wild."

When Lund appears in the nationally televised pageant on Aug. 13, the audience will get to see another Deseret Industries exclusive.

She's keeping quiet about details of the design, but is proud of the price tag — \$1.48.

Arsonists, pyromaniacs terrorize doomed town

DETROIT — Stephanie Barnett found it hard enough to think about giving up her home in Poletown to make way for a new automobile factory. But now, as her neighbors move out, the arsonists are moving in.

Barnett, her retired husband and brother live in constant fear as they wait for the government relocation grant that will fund their move from the once tightly knit, ethnic neighborhood.

Poletown is being abandoned as the city razes 1,500 homes and businesses to clear a 465-acre site for General Motors Corp.'s planned assembly plant.

The demolition has brought a new terror to the neighborhood.

Poletown is burning.

More than 200 fires have been investigated in the area since January by the Detroit Fire Department's arson squad. Most of the blazes are in vacant buildings awaiting demolition, and most are attributed to arsonists.

Surprisingly, no one has been killed or seriously hurt — so far.

"I'm a nervous wreck," said the elderly Mrs. Barnett, who has had a fire as close as next door. "In the old days, we took care of everything. But you can't

watch all the time."

Earl J. Berry, the head of the city fire department, said one unit serving Poletown responded more fires in June than any company had in 1967 riots in Detroit.

Every block in Poletown is scarred with frame houses standing blackened and windows gaping holes cut by firefighters or flames. The charred timber hangs over the streets.

Arson investigators have several theories. Some youths are setting the fires, that demolition crews are paying to have arsonists set fires that will burn down their own homes to collect insurance.

But some say that areas undergoing demolition simply have become a playground for pyromaniacs.

Most homeowners displaced by the demolition sold their homes to the city of Detroit for less than they were worth. But Mrs. Barnett also is desperately awaiting government relocation grant, without which she can't close the contract on her new home.

She and her elderly husband and her brother have been forced into the role of security guards, watching the home and keeping their lights on through the night.

Contract may be rejected by union

WASHINGTON — The head of the air traffic controllers union said Tuesday he thinks members will reject a tentative agreement reached last month with the Federal Aviation Administration.

Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization leader Robert Poli said there is a "feeling" among members that the contract will be rejected because he will not personally accept it for rejection.

Negotiations with the Aviation Administration reopened if the contract is rejected, Poli said.

Ballots were mailed to 15,000 union members and Poli said they were counted by July 28.

The contract calls for a 40-hour week, increase in the night shift, removal of the minimum pay that may be used for veteran controllers medically disqualified.

Poli said members were the most dissatisfied with the contract's failure to reduce pay as my concerns.
