New immigration laws allow millions to live legally in U.S.

HOUSTON — Attorney General William French Smith, defending an announced shift in immigration policy by the Reagan Administration, says the policies of the past do not face the realities of the illegal alien problem in the United States today.

Smith addressed the Houston Chamber of Commerce Monday via closed circuit hook-up from Washington. He blamed the "intolerable situation" with undocumented workers on the lack of an enforceable immigration policy.

"All of these needs have reached their present dimension because the country has not had a realistic and comprehensive immigration policy that it could and would enforce," he said.

He estimated that there were more than a

half million illegal aliens in Texas, along with 75,000 refugees from Laos and Cambodia. He said the proposed policy would have the stronger effect on Texas, but called it a "national policy."

The president's legalization or amnesty program for illegal aliens now in the United States could allow for up to 5 million of them, mostly from Mexico, to stay here and work legally on a temporary basis, which could be extended every three years.

Smith emphasized, however, that the new policy would work only with the cooperation of the employers who are supplying jobs to illegal aliens.

"It is not now an offense for an employer to hire an illegal alien. That must be corrected," Smith said. "As long as illegal aliens can find

jobs in the United States, with wages seven times as much as in their own countries they will be drawn to the United States."

The president's new policy will allow Mexican jobseekers to work in the United States and permit millions of illegal aliens to stay legally, but would penalize employers caught hiring the undocumented workers.

"The border cannot be sealed. Illegal migration cannot be deterred unless employers participate," Smith said.

He said, however, he also favored protecting the unknowing employer and permanent resident from harassment.

Those opposing the program say it actually increase illegal immigration and domestic unemployment.

Redistricting plan to be amended

AUSTIN — A group of moderate and liberal Democrats, who fell short last week of amending a

congressional redistricting bill they said favored Republicans, have finally triumphed over Speaker Bill Clayton and Republicans and conservative Democrats who supported him.

The House took 15 minutes to accept the motion by Bush, the chairman of the Democratic Caucus.

The House voted 78-66 Monday to send the controversial redistricting proposal back to the House Committee on Regions, Compacts and Districts for work on a plan that will be more "acceptable" to Democrats.

Bush contended the bill was pushed through the committee last week by the panel's sponsor, Rep. Tim Von Dohlen, D-Goliad. He said the committee, which begins work on a new proposal Wednesday, did not have ample opportunity to fully understand the details of the congressional redistricting bill because Von Dohlen demanded a committee vote only hours after he laid out the bill.

Bob Slagle, chairman of the State Democratic Party, said party solidarity was responsible for the victory over Clayton.

"This was a very satisfying vote for me. We kept coming up short by a vote or two, so we are very happy. Now we'll get this thing back in committee and try to get something that is acceptable."

Clayton, hoping to gather the votes to thwart the effort by the Democratic Caucus to send the bill back to committee, stalled House action for more than four hours before recognizing Rep. Bob Bush, D-Sherman, on a mo-

tion to recommit the proposal.

"We went against our own philosophy," Bush said. "We did not allow everyone to have input into the bill."

"Ultimately, this House not the committee will have to make the final decision," Von Dohlen said.

Monday's vote means the Legislature has but one week to send Gov. Bill Clements a congressional redistricting bill. But Bush said the Senate-approved bill was

flawed and another special session would be a small sacrifice to make to make the proper compromise to speak for the people of Texas.

"The longer people are trapped in Manhattan (Senate) bill, the more they were happy with it," Bush said in Manhattan Tuesday. "This is an extremely important matter and we can do better, if it means coming out here for another special session."

Rep. Paul Ragsdale, D-Dallas, said he had the necessary votes in committee for his proposal. He said he creates a minority district in Dallas, but gives two incumbents, Rep. Frost and Jim Mattox — another opportunity of re-election.

Ragsdale said his plan concedes only one of three districts Texas is getting to the cans.

He acknowledged that for his plan to be accepted, he had been hampered last week by preliminary debate on the floor on the redistricting bill.

"But there's some tenacity and patience," he said.
