Pet snake is toxic type

LOS ANGELES — A 20-year-old man bitten by what he thought was a harmless snake he had purchased from a pet shop was in critical condition Tuesday. Authorities searched for another person who bought a similar reptile.
 The victim, whose name was not released, was bitten on the thumb Friday shortly after buying what turned out to be a poisonous Red Necked Keelback snake at the Safari Pet Store in North Hollywood.
 Animal control officials were trying to trace an unidentified person who apparently purchased another of the highly poisonous snakes two or three weeks earlier.
 The snake, one of four obtained by the store from what a spokesman called "a reputable dealer," was supposed to be another non-poisonous type of reptile. The man became nauseous shortly after the snake bit him and the next day he sought medical help.

Beatle's Bentley sold to surgeon

AUBURN, Ind. — For \$325,000, a Las Vegas, Nev., surgeon is the new owner of a wildly painted Bentley once owned by slain Beatle John Lennon.
 Lonnie Hannagren made the last bid Monday at the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Festival and classic car auction to win title to the luxury automobile, which features a blue-green-yellow exterior and a pink-and-purple interior.
 The sale price represents a profit of \$275,000 for the car's previous owner, Ron Morgan, who paid \$50,000 for the car when he purchased it from a museum two weeks after Lennon was shot to death last December.
 Another Bentley, painted to look like Lennon's former car, has been offered for sale in collector's magazines. Morgan said, which is why he wanted to sell his car.

Wallace gunman battles for diary of shooting plans

MADISON, Wis. — Part of Arthur Bremer's diary, revealing his obsession to kill former President Richard Nixon or former Alabama Gov. George Wallace, will be the object of a court battle in Green Lake, Wis., Thursday.
 Bremer, who was convicted of trying to assassinate Wallace in a Laurel, Md., shopping center May 15, 1972, is trying to regain possession of the 148-page handwritten manuscript. The diary is in the possession of attorney Jack McManus, who represents its finder - Sherman Griffin, a Dalton, Wis., construction worker.
 Griffin stumbled upon the di-

ary, wrapped in plastic and foil, while working at a Milwaukee bridge site in August 1980. Griffin wants to sell the manuscript.
 Bremer, who is serving a 53-year sentence in the medium security Maryland Correctional Institution in Hagerstown, will not be present in court. He is eligible for parole next May.
 The disputed pages represent the first part of a 261-page diary outlining Bremer's plan to assassinate either Nixon or Wallace.
 "Now I start my diary of my personal plot to kill by pistol either Richard Nixon or George

Wallace," Bremer wrote. "I intend to shoot one or the other while he attends a champagne (sic) rally for the Wisconsin Presidential primary."
 Bremer is represented by Attorney Benjamin Lipsitz, who claims to have evidence his client concealed the diary and did not abandon it.
 The last 113 pages of Bremer's diary were recovered shortly after the shooting and were published under the title "Diary of An Assassin." It notes Bremer's problems finding a place to hide the 148 pages Griffin found.

Yule season comes early for Reagans

WASHINGTON — Under the direction of First Lady Nancy Reagan, a Christmas tree with glittering ornaments was set up Monday in the White House family quarters.

Press secretary Sheila Tate said Mrs. Reagan is not rushing the yule season but had the tree set up so photographers for the Ladies Home Journal could take pictures to accompany an interview with the first lady for the magazine's December issue.

Tate said Mrs. Reagan is zipping along with her Christmas planning: the traditional parties, selection of the first family's greeting cards and choosing mementos and gifts for staff and friends.
 The Reagans plan to spend Christmas Day in the White House.
