Social Security solution sinking

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Thomas O'Neill scuttled any notion of finding a long-term funding solution this year for problems of the Social Security system.

O'Neill said he would support a stopgap funding measure — such as letting the three Social Security trust funds borrow from one another — but would refuse to take part in efforts for a long-term solution.

Members of the Senate Finance Committee Wednesday debated whether allowing borrowing among Social Security trust funds — the only step Democrats favor — is enough to save the system.

Republicans are reluctant to back a major overhaul of Social Security because of Democratic resistance to more than interlocking borrowing. The committee meeting was called to assess progress for a long-range bill.

New flight system adopted

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The first American-produced instrument landing system, which will allow aircraft to land in extremely adverse weather conditions, has been commissioned for use at Kansas City International Airport.

The new system guides aircraft to the touchdown point of the runway in weather conditions with a nearly zero cloud ceiling and less

than 700 feet of forward visibility. At most airports, aircraft cannot land if weather conditions are below a 200 foot cloud ceiling and 1/2 mile forward visibility.

The Category III system was developed and produced by Wilcox Electric, of Kansas City, a subsidiary of the Northrop Corporation.

The new systems will be installed at Detroit Metropolitan, Chi-

cago O'Hare, New York Kennedy International, Los Angeles International, Portland (Ore.) International, Seattle Tacoma (Wash.) International, Dulles International, Washington, D.C., and Denver's Stapleton International Airport.

The new system was tested by the Federal Aviation Administration before the Kansas City system was commissioned.

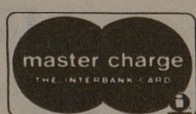
