Mexicans go hungry to go free

United Press International SAN ANTONIO — Bexar County Sheriff Joe Neaves said Tuesday five Mexican nationals being held by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service staged a three-day hunger strike to encourage officials to release them.

Neaves said the men were mong some 35 Mexicans being held by federal officials as material witnesses in cases against people accused of transporting illegal aliens from Mexico to the United States

"They had been here since June, and they wanted Immigration to do something with them — get them out or send them back to Mexico or something," Neaves


