Sweden, has been honored by the U.S. Congress and has performed for numerous U.S. presidents and Queen Elizabeth.

Last week, he was knighted in Finland. He was honored for his help in establishing the "Thanks to Scandinavia" program which pro-vides scholarships to Scandinavanians who wish to study at American universities.

Performing with Borge is opera soloist Marylyn Mul-vey, who has been a member of the Victor Borge Company for several years.
