Men's soccer plays at home against Tigers

Although its chances of winning the Southwest Conference Soccer League title have decreased slightly, the Texas A&M University men's soccer team still has hope.

The squad has compiled an overall record of 3-3-2, and a SWCSL mark of 2-0-2. Coach Telmo Franco thinks his team still has an excellent chance to win the league championship, and he said that the Aggies' match with SMU Nov. 1 will be their most important of the year. The varsity Mustangs, at 8-3-1, are ranked in the nation's top 20, and Franco said that the Aggies are already preparing for that match.

Texas A&M entertains Texas Southern University Saturday at 2 p.m. in Kyle Field. The match will be the second played in Kyle Field during the last two weeks, as the women's team played Stephen F. Austin University Oct. 3 in the stadium.

Franco said he doesn't know what to expect from the varsity TSU team, but he hopes that the Aggies can rebound from their tough tie a week ago with the Texas Tech Red Raiders. He said Texas A&M should have won the match, but he was pleased with the effort of his players.

"Against Tech, we played to win," Franco said. "We played well — the spirit was there. I was satisfied with the players' desire to win. We don't have a quality team yet, but we will."

Franco said that the team has performed well despite the ties and losses it has suffered this season.

Ags can push Bears out of race

Aggie touchdowns were few and far between in the 1980 Texas A&M University-Baylor University football game in Kyle Field. On the other hand, the Bears poured six touchdowns on the Aggies, keeping pace with the rainy weather in Baylor's 46-7 win.

This year, the setting will be different when the Aggies play the Bears Saturday in Waco's Baylor Stadium. Texas A&M hopes that the game's outcome will be a turnaround from last year's embarrassing loss to the Bears.

At this time last year, the Aggies had a 2-4 record, compared to their current record of 4-1. The Bears entered the 1980 contest with a 5-0 record, but have strug-

gled so far this season and have only a 3-3 record. Texas A&M was only one of Baylor's eight stepping-stones to the Southwest Conference crown in 1980, but the Aggies have higher hopes this year after last week's 7-6 win over the University of Houston.

Baylor lost Saturday to Southern Methodist University by a score of 37-20.

In the 1980 game, the two teams played an even first quarter, but the rain, combined with the Bears' superiority, led to a runaway second quarter that left the Aggies in an impossible-

catch-up position. Baylor had a 3-0 lead after the first quarter, but quarterback Jay Jeffrey threw touchdown passes of 32, 2 and 15 yards to give the Bears a 25-0 lead at halftime.

The Aggies didn't score until quarterback Gary Kubiak scored on a 3-yard keeper with 24 seconds left in the game. Coming off the bench, Kubiak played well in completing 7-of-16 passes for 114 yards, but the Texas A&M defense couldn't stop the powerful offense of the Bears. Baylor out-gained the Aggies 457 to 234 in total offense, while the Bears also

had 25 first downs to the Aggies' 12.

Baylor ran 90 offensive plays to the Aggies' 59, and each team committed six turnovers in the Bears' biggest SWC win ever over the Aggies. Last week against the Cougars, Texas A&M played a relatively turnover-free game, and the team will have to turn in the same kind performance Saturday against the Bears.

Leading the Aggies offensively are Johnny Hector, with 476 yards rushing, and Earnest Jackson, with 443 yards on the ground. Kubiak has completed 41 of 91

passes for 670 yards and 10 touchdowns, and is averaging 165.2 yards a game in offense.

Baylor relies heavily on running back Walter Abercrombie, who has rushed for 433 yards, hasn't been as effective as a year, when he finished with 1,044 yards during the Bears' 104-38 team in 1980. Jeffrey has picked up where he left off by completing 52 of 93 passes for 806 yards. Jeffrey ranks directly behind Kubiak with his average of 154 yards total offense a game.

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
