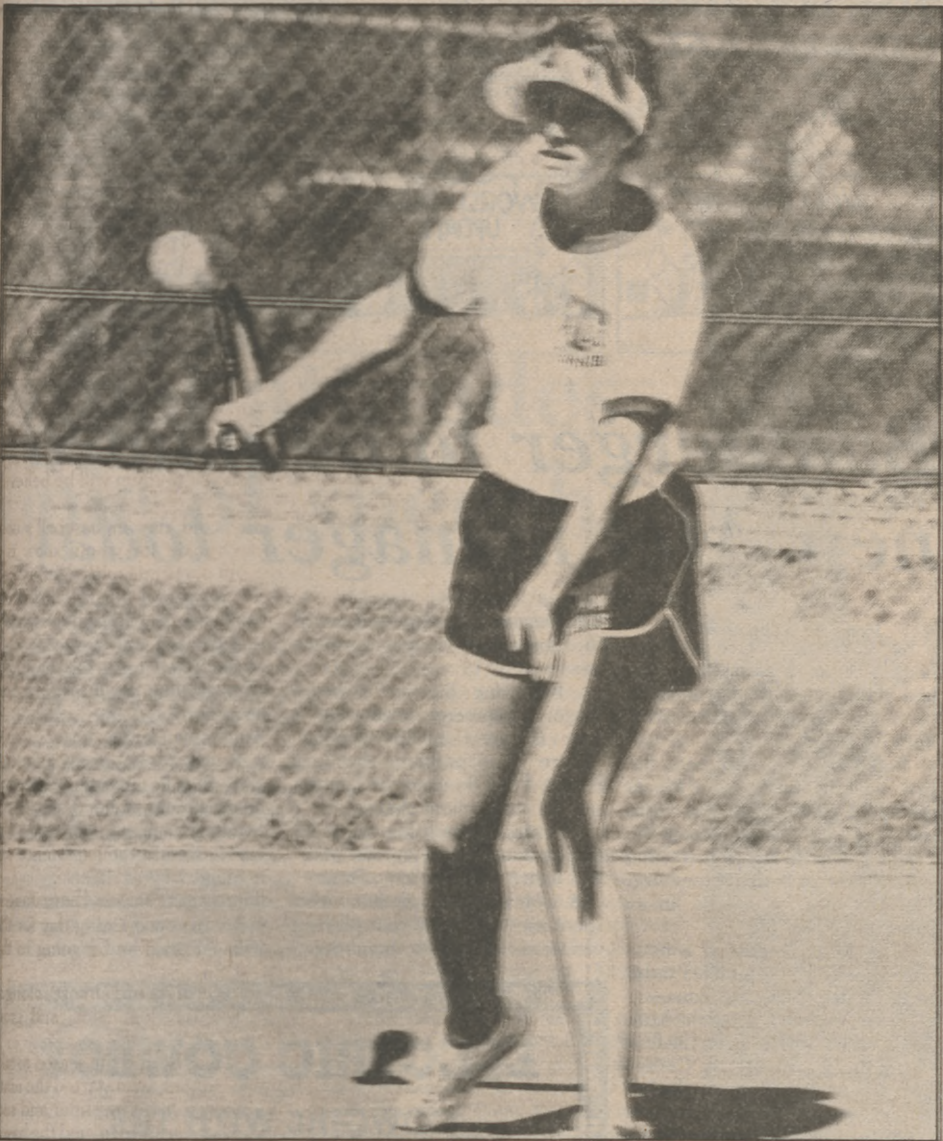

## Women's tennis team wins Houston Open tournament

Once again, the Texas A&M University women's tennis team showed its quality by dominating another tournament.

Last week, the Aggs won both the singles and doubles competition in the Texarkana Invitational tournament. This week, the players in the Houston Open Tennis tournament fell victim to Texas A&M as six of eight singles quarterfinal spots and two of four semifinal spots belonged to Texas A&M players.

Junior Pam Hill won the singles title and was in the doubles final. She teamed with Marilyn Houston to advance through the competition before losing to Karen Denman and Michelle Lantz of the University of Trinity, 6-2, 6-2.

"The girls just ran out of steam," said Aggie coach Jim Cannon. "They both played long, tough matches in singles and just couldn't make it in the finals."

The doubles champions had to beat Amy Glass-Sonja Blutzkerson of A&M in the semifinals to get to the finals. In a tough, three set match, the pair from Trinity won 3-6, 6-1, 6-3.

"The competition was stiff at both levels," said the Aggie coach. "But, I think this year we played more club pros than before."

Becca Rasor, Kelly Hobart and Barbara Alwater did well in the amateur division. Both Rasor and Hobart got to the semifinals in the singles. Rasor won the title by

beating Donna Hinley 6-2, 6-1. Hobart was defeated by Hinley 2-6, 6-1, 6-3 in the semifinals.

Alwater teamed with Rasor to win the doubles title. The two played five matches to get to the finals where they defeated Beebe Chubb-Sandy Donaldson 6-2, 6-3 from East Texas State University to take the title.

"All the girls played very well, as evidenced by the results," said Cannon. "It's hard to single anyone out but Pam Hill really played great. She even had to beat three teammates in the middle three rounds to reach the finals."

Hill defeated Jeannie Hopkins in the first round 6-0, 6-1. She then began to beat her own teammates as she defeated Marilyn Houston 7-6, 6-3; Teresa Landry 6-3, 6-3 and Lilliana Fernandez 6-4, 4-6, 3-2 retired.

In the finals, Hill defeated Denman 6-4, 4-6, 6-4.

"Pam had just completed two, tough three set wins going into the doubles finals," the coach said. "I am not surprised she just ran out of gas."

In doubles, Hill teamed with Houston to reach the finals. The pair were seeded third in the tour-

namment. In the semifinals, the team defeated second seeded Janice Mauldin-Lisa Ladig 6-3, 6-4.

The tournament was not without its prize. However, as these Aggies had slight injuries in the cold, damp weather in Houston, Fernandez redeveloped bursitis in her shoulder. She had suffered through a bout with it last year but had been healthy so far this season. Rasor has tendonitis in her foot. Landry has a stress fracture in the fibula but has a doctor's OK to compete if she can stand the pain.

### Hitch concerned with attention given OU — UT

DALLAS — Southern Methodist University athletic director Bob Hitch would like to do something about his school's bi-annual collision with the Texas-Oklahoma football game.

But he's not quite sure what it will be. Hitch came to SMU from Missouri this year and one of the biggest surprises he has had since his arrival in Dallas has been the attention given the Texas-Oklahoma matchup.

"It really shocked me to see the publicity that game gets," said Hitch. "One of the local papers didn't have any story about our game that week (with Baylor) until Wednesday and it didn't have anything else until Saturday."

"Of course, there is no reason for me to get mad about it. There is nothing we can do."

One thing Hitch said he would like to do is to have the Mustangs playing out of town each year when Texas-Oklahoma time comes around.

"But it's not fair for our players and coaches to play in Waco every year," he said. "If we could work it out with our conference schedule we might try to play a non-

conference opponent on the road that weekend each year."

In 1979 the Baylor-SMU game, played a few hours after the Texas-Oklahoma contest, drew a capacity crowd in Texas Stadium. This year's Baylor-SMU contest in Texas Stadium attracted a crowd of 33,310.

"I know the gross gate this year was larger than two years ago (because of tickets given away to the 1979 game)," Hitch said.

This week's meeting between Texas and SMU could well be the richest home game in the history of the Mustangs. SMU no longer gives away free tickets and every fan in the stadium represents a full-priced seat.
