The number of injuries should decline during the remainder of flag football because, "Injuries are less during playoffs because you have better players out there, Dittman said.







He said the meet has been run as a relay race for four years but Aggies skipped last year's meet. The meet was a new concept to him when he came to Texas, Nix said.


