Coach Wilson praised his team's efforts in Saturday's win and said the Aggies are starting to show themselves.

"Our offensive output was impressive," Wilson said. "I've felt that for several weeks that we

were close to exploding."

The Aggies rolled up 486 yards in the effort, giving the Ags a 398.1 yard average per game. Kubiak is the number 10 passer in the nation, averaging 134.3 yards a game with his total of 1,143 yards and 10 touchdowns. He ranks 21st in total offense, accounting for 1,372 yards and a game average of 196

Kubiak passed for six touch-downs and ran for another Satur-day and was rewarded for his performance by being named the offensive player of the game by the coaching staff.

Defensive end Jon van Sant was recognized as the defensive player of the game for his aggressive play, while linebacker Greg Berry was named the specialty teams' player

Although pleased with the win, Wilson said his team needs to improve defensively.

'Our defense totally dominated them (Rice) the first half," he said. But, the second-half breakdowns

were not very pleasing."
The Aggies took a 31-7 halftime lead and virtually shut the Owls down during the first half, yielding only 96 total yards. However, the Owls finished the day with 379 total yards, only 18 on the ground.
