## Crime Stoppers to start Dec. 1

Brazos County residents will soon be able to help solve crimes through the efforts of the Crime Stoppers program, which is scheduled to begin Dec. 1.

"The program originated in September 1976 in Albuquerque, N.M., and now 120 similar programs have been formed throughout the nation," University Police Chief Russ McDonald said.

McDonald said he first learned about the program on KVUE-TV in Austin. He said he was impressed with the results of the program and began to organize a similar one in Brazos County.

Crime Stoppers programs are televised dramatizations of crimes designed to involve area residents through anonymous volunteering of information.

"Public involvement is the main key to the program, and this is done by offering a reward in exchange for information," McDonald said.

Any information leading to the arrest and indictment of a criminal will result in a tax-free reward, he said. There is a \$1,000 reward for aid in solving "the crime of the week," he said.

To receive the reward for helping solve the crime of the week, citizens must call in information to police within seven days after initial publication of information about the crime.

Any citizen who helps solve other crimes can also receive up to \$1,000, depending on the reward set for the crime by the Crime Stoppers board of directors.

The callers remain anonymous and are assigned a code number, McDonald said. The code number is used as a communication signal between Crime Stoppers and the caller.

"The Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring Crime Stoppers and is helping form the program's board of directors, which will operate the program," McDonald said.

Criminal Deputy Charles

Owen, program coordinator, said his job is to be a liaison between the Police Department, board of directors and news media.

"Not all the board members have been selected," Owen said, "but their role in the program is to select an unsolved crime each week and to set the reward for other crimes solved by information given by citizens."

The unsolved crimes chosen by the board will be dramatized by the Texas A&M Aggie Players Stage Center and high school stage groups, McDonald said.

KBTX-TV will film the reenactments of the unsolved crimes and present them during the three newscasts of one hour each week, McDonald said.

Jeff Braun, KBTX-TV news director, said he and photographer Kathi Beasley visited KVUE-TV in Austin to learn the production and technological aspects of the program.

"The actual reenactment on television has to be as accurate as possible for the viewers in order for this program to work," Braun said.
