

Southerland fills in for Vandiver

Class of '83 discusses policies

By TIM FOARDE Battalion Staff The class of '83 meeting didn't get to hear Texas A&M President Frank Vandiver, but instead got a chance to question Vice President Malon Southerland on problems and concerns of the University.

Students asked the vice presi-dent about plans to build on Duncan Field, expansion of the campus, dorm construction, limits on enrollment and even Greek recognition.

Vandiver, scheduled to speak at the class of '83 monthly meeting last night, had an administrative problem that demanded his attention and caused him to cancel his speech, Southerland said.

Students asked the administrator about plans to construct a building for the A&M Press on Duncan Field. The field is used for intramural sports and is the site for the Aggie bonfire.

Ducan Field was selected over alternative sites based on contract sations with the director of the press and the Board of Regents nuitding Committee, Souther-building Committee, Southeralternative sites based on conver-


The limited amount of space has caused problems for all types of construction plans, he said.




