## Insurance may be cut for federal workers

ATLANTA — Congress must act within the next few weeks to prevent health insurance coverage for nearly 2 million federal workers from being cut off, an insurance company executive says.  
James Gillman, director of Blue Cross-Blue Shield's federal employee program, said in an interview Sunday the program is on the verge of bankruptcy.  
Gillman put the blame on federal budget cutting, which lowered the government's contribution to premiums for its employees.

health insurance. Now, Blue Cross-Blue Shield will pay out about \$200 million more in benefits than it receives in subscriber income, he said.  
Gillman said 1.8 million government workers and 5 million family members insured by Blue Cross-Blue Shield will find themselves without coverage beginning Jan. 1, 1982, unless a recovery plan is worked out by Congress.  
Insurance to non-government workers would not be affected.

"It would be wrong for us to jeopardize their money for federal employees," Gillman said. "It would be Blue Cross and Blue Shield bailing out the federal government because it wasn't willing to pay its own costs."  
Gillman said the federal employee program was operating at the lowest reserve level ever—\$13 million, or enough to pay one day's worth of claims. Normally the program operates with 18 months' worth of financial reserves — about \$360 million.

## Supreme Court rejects amusement park ride case

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court refused Monday to review an amusement park case which pits consumer protection against the Reagan administration's drive to reduce regulations on businesses.  
The justices ordered a federal appeals court to dismiss a dispute between the Texas State Fair and the federal Consumer Product Safety Commission over whether amusement park rides are consumer products that the CPSC can regulate.  
The controversy involved the Skyride at the Texas State Fair in

Dallas, where passengers traveled over the amusement park grounds in open gondolas attached to a single moving cable.  
On Oct. 21, 1979, four of the gondolas collided and fell to the ground, killing one passenger. A similar accident at an amusement park in Missouri caused three deaths and prompted an investigation by the CPSC.  
Texas State Fair officials, however, refused to allow a commission engineer to inspect the ride or examine documents concerning it. The fair filed suit seeking a judgment that the ride is not a consumer product and is outside

the CPSC's jurisdiction.  
But a federal appeals court ruled that the ride is a consumer product, and the commission has the right to inspect it.  
Six weeks after the appeals court ruling, however, President Reagan signed into law his sweeping budget law, which includes a provision that specifically excludes fixed-site amusement park rides from the definition of consumer products.  
As a result, the Justice Department advised the high court to refuse to hear the case because the dispute was resolved by legislative action.

## Iran raid colonel starts anti-terrorist business

AUSTIN — Retired Army Col. Charles Beckwith, 52, who led the aborted rescue mission of the 52 American hostages in Iran, has established a Texas security company to advise corporations and foreign governments how to avoid terrorist attacks.  
Beckwith said the April 25, 1980, raid on Tehran and the subsequent publicity the ill-fated mission brought made him a celebrity, but destroyed his ability to function in covert activities.  
The career soldier retired from the Army Sept. 30. His last command was the 97-man Delta Group, a specially trained group of soldiers whose Tehran mission was scrapped by the collision of two aircraft in Iran's Dasht-e Kavir Desert.  
Beckwith, who was nicknamed "Chargin' Charlie" by his troops, volunteered for service in Vietnam three times, where he was wounded while commanding a special forces group.  
His hard-nosed attitude is reflected in a plaque that adorns his desk, "Kill 'em all. Let God sort 'em out."  
Security Assistance Service of Texas Ltd., was formed by Beckwith in early October. He employs two former members of Delta Force and a former secret service agent.  
"No names," Beckwith said. "Just say there's a little bitty fellow, a big fellow and one in the middle."
