## Volleyball team wins tourney Woods' 23 points leads Ags past Windsor 109-70

A solid defensive effort highlighted by seniors Wendy Wilson and Kristen Bloom took the Texas A&M women's volleyball to its third championship of the season in the last weekend's Louisiana State University Tournament.  
The Aggies, ranked 14th before

the tournament and sure to move up in the polls, defeated the University of Saskatchewan in the finals 15-8, 15-11, 10-15, and 15-6. The win boosted their tournament record to 4-0 and their season mark to 39-14.  
"I was very pleased with our team play," Coach Terry Condon said. "We had a great overall effort

and our defense really shined. Seniors Wendy Wilson and Kristen Bloom sparked our very controlled and united team effort."  
In the first of three preliminary rounds, the Aggies dropped Saskatchewan 15-4, 14-16, 15-11, and 15-6, and they nipped host LSU 15-8, 9-15, 15-10, 11-15, and 15-10 in the second match. A 16-14, 15-13, 15-6 victory over Tulane University in the last round of pool play earned the Aggies a seat in the finals against Saskatchewan, whom they promptly defeated for the second time in two days.  
"We didn't really play that well Friday, but Saturday we kind of

brought things together," Wilson said. "Our defense was really playing well. We were actually applying things that we'd been practicing."  
Condon said the players would rest over Thanksgiving to gear up for the national tournament in December. The Aggies were invited to nationals last year, but this season is the first time they've been seeded in the top twenty prior to the tournament.  
The Aggies will scrimmage Sam Houston State University Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. before facing the University of Texas in their final regular-season game Nov. 24.

Woods' 23 points leads Ags past Windsor 109-70

Rudy Woods has a point to prove, and he's off to a good start in his attempt.  
After missing the Aggies' 1981 spring schedule because of academic ineligibility, the 6-11 senior center for the Texas A&M University basketball team led the Aggies to an easy 109-70 exhibition win over the Windsor Basketball Club Saturday night in front of only 3,693 fans in C. Rollier White Coliseum. Woods has received a mixture of compliments and criticism during his Texas A&M career, but he's trying to change that by having a strong senior year for the Aggies.  
Scoring 23 points, pulling down 22 rebounds, blocking two shots and coming up with five steals, the 6-11 Woods paced six Aggie double-figure scorers in the romp over the Canadians.  
Aggie coach Shelby Metcalf used 13 players in the game, with Woods and forward Claude Riley each playing only 26 minutes. The starting five of Woods, Riley, forward Roy Jones, and guards Tyren Naulls and Reggie Roberts combined for 75 points and 50 of the

Aggies' amazing total of 81 rebounds, while Windsor had only 38 rebounds.  
Riley and Naulls scored 14 points apiece, while Riley had 12 rebounds and Naulls had nine. Jones, Roberts and second-string center Lonnie Bluntson had 12 points each, while Bluntson was the third Aggie rebounder in double figures with 11.  
Also scoring for the Aggies were forwards Mike Thomas and Kevin Cunningham with six, guard Milton Woodley with four, forward Rhett Reed with two, and guards Mike Brown and Bruce Sooter with two apiece.  
The Canadians were led by their guards, as starting guards Mike Brkovich and Ed Bialek had 16 points apiece. Rod Curry came off the bench to score 11.  
The Aggies played aggressively throughout the game, jumping to a 20-3 lead on Woods' tip-in dunk at the 14:14 mark of the first half. The Canadians pulled within eight, 27-19, with 7:36 remaining in the half, but Texas A&M broke away to a 50-28 lead at halftime when Jones dunked a Gary Lewis alley-oop pass with 44 seconds left in the half. Lewis, a freshman guard from Tuscon, Ariz., didn't assist in 11 minutes of play.  
The Aggies shot 46 percent from the field during the first half, compared to Windsor's miserable 33 percent. However, both teams shot better in the second half, as Texas A&M finished at 52 percent and the Canadians shot slightly better than in the first half to finish at 37 percent.  
The Aggies shot 56 percent from the free throw line for the game, while Windsor managed only 41. Leading Texas A&M from the line were Riley and Roberts, who both hit all four of their free throws. Naulls led the Aggies in field goal percentage, hitting six of nine shots.  
At times, the game became sloppy, as Texas A&M committed 31 turnovers and Windsor had 36. However, the Aggies' superiority under the basket proved to be the difference, as Woods, Riley and Bluntson outboarded the less aggressive Canadians.

Metcalf said he was pleased with the Aggies' play, acknowledging the performances of Woods, Naulls and freshman walk-on Cunningham. The forward's six points came in only minutes of play, as he hit all three of his shots and grabbed three rebounds.  
"I thought Rudy did a good job," Metcalf said. "I was kind of impressed with Cunningham. He's fit into the system real well. I think he's got a chance to become a real solid person — he's always in the right place at the right time."

Metcalf also praised Naulls, who showed a great deal of skill in his Texas A&M debut by teaming with Roberts in the backcourt to execute several effective breaks.  
"He's a real non-sense type guy," Metcalf said. "He adds an ingredient to the team that we really need — maturity. He's been there, he's been to the West Coast (with UCLA in 1979-80) he knows what it's like."  
Freshman guard Lewis said he was nervous, but felt that he played well in his first Aggie appearance.  
"I thought you could say I had those first-game jitters. Basically I thought I played pretty well, except for my free throws (of which he missed all three of his attempts)."  
"I feel pretty much at ease playing with the guys, because I've put anyone above me," Lewis said. "I just say I can play as well as them and go out there and do my job. They don't want another job like last year — everybody's going to start from scratch and win from there."  
The Aggies' begin the regular season Nov. 30, hosting St. Edward's University of Austin at 7 p.m. Texas A&M then hosts Sam Houston State University Dec. 7.

### Golf teams play well in tournaments

Oklahoma State University dominated the college golf scene in two countries last week, taking first place in a men's tournament in Austin, 21 strokes ahead of the Aggies, and capturing the individual title in a women's tournament in Monterey, Mexico.  
The Aggie women finished second in the 15-team Torneo Universitario Femenil de Golf weekend, finishing one shot behind Southern Methodist's 89. The men's team was sixth in the week's Harvey Penick Intercollegiate with a team total of 1,113.  
Danny Briggs fired a two-over par 218 to pace the Aggie men with individual rounds of 77-77 on the Morris Williams golf course. Tracy Phillips of Oklahoma State was the medalist at 210. Gary Krueger had a 221 for the Aggies, and Bart Cobb contributed a 224. Jaeky Lee shot a 225, Ronny Byrd a 225, and Paul Oglesby a 236.  
Shirley Furlong led the Aggie attack south of the border, shooting a 73-75-75-223, only five shots off tournament leader Janice Heber, also from Oklahoma State. Herica Gonzalez and Monica Webb finished at 224, trailed by Susan Yantis at 229 and Jackie Bertram at 235.


