Petition opposes state 'gag' order

United Press International LUFKIN — An East Texas

newspaper and major newspaper chain have petitioned a federal judge to overturn a state court ruling that says the media may be barred from pre-trial

civil suit hearings.

"I think the impact is obvious," said Joe Murray, editor and publisher of the Lufkin Daily News, which filed the suit in conjunction with Cox Enter-prises Inc. "This would set a big precedent and be one more area that the public simply is kept in the dark about. The judge ruled that the public — which includes the news media — could not walk into public court.'

The ruling was made last August by Longview State District Judge Marcus Vascocu on a motion by attorneys for Lufkin's Texas National Bank. A group of bank stockholders had filed a civil suit action over a management dispute with controlling stockholders.

The bank attorneys success fully argued that national banking laws permit the exclusion of the public from a courtroom if sensitive or complicated financial matters are to be discussed.
