Brady to make it home for Thanksgiving Day

WASHINGTON — White House press secretary James Brady, gravely wounded in the head during the March 30 assassination attempt on President

Reagan, will be home in time for Thanksgiving. Brady's deputy press secretary, Larry Speakes, said Friday, Brady would leave the hospital Monday for good.

Brady, 41, who has been recuperating at George Washington University Medical Center for the last eight months, has been working very hard on his physical therapy regimen to prepare for his release, his doctors said.

"Everyone who is directly involved (in his recovery) is very, very pleased," Dr. Dennis O'Leary, the hospital spokesman, said. "Jim Brady will leave for home for good on Monday," Speakes told reporters at the White House.

Brady was the most gravely wounded during the attempt on Reagan's life. A gunman fired at Reagan as he emerged from a Washington hotel, striking Reagan in the lung, a Secret Service agent in the stomach, a policeman in the neck and Brady in the head.

Brady's condition was so critical that his neurosurgeon, Dr. Arthur Kober, said on the day of the shooting: "I don't think he can make it."

He has undergone four operations — three on the brain — since the shooting. He also suffered an epileptic-style seizure, pneumonia, rashes and other complications.

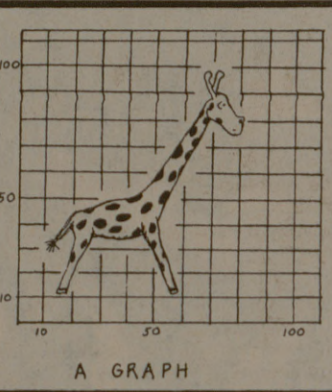
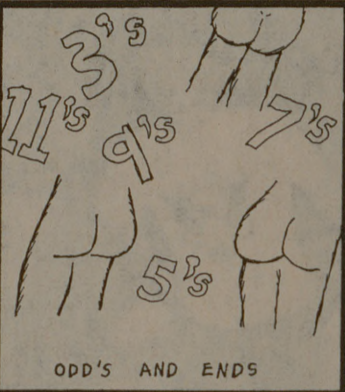
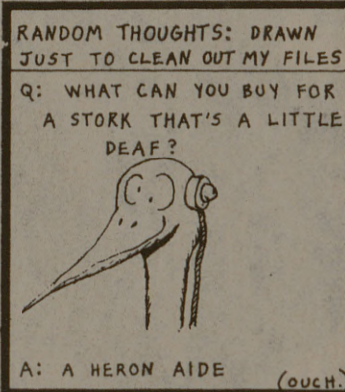
His recovery was viewed as a near miracle in medical circles.

Brady has suffered paralysis on his left side. His doctors hope he will eventually be able to walk with a cane, but his left arm is expected to remain paralyzed.

He is intellectually sound, Dr. O'Leary said.

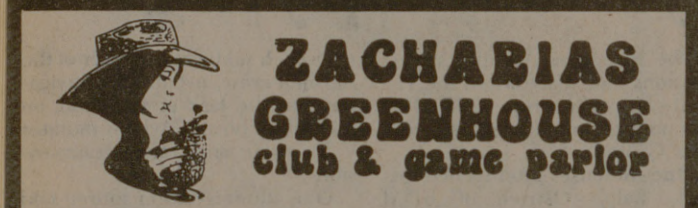

Ark of the Covenant finding claimed fake by theologian

WINFIELD, Kan. — A Wichita State University theologian says he believes a Kansas religious group's claim to have found the lost Ark of the Covenant in a cave in Jordan is a hoax.

Tom Crotser, the leader of the group and its four-man expedition, said he found the Ark in a cave in Jordan's Mount Pisgah — and has pictures to back his claim, although he won't release them.

Jeremiah Unterman, an assistant professor of religion at Wichita State, said he doesn't believe the claim.

"I think it's a hoax," said Unterman, who specializes in the Old Testament and the Hebrew Bible. "There is no evidence for what he has said to have accomplished. He

also said he found Noah's Ark, and there's just no evidence for any of this.

"I don't know of any biblical scholars or archaeologists who take any of his claims seriously."

Crotser said Friday he is not disturbed that some theologians and scholars believe his claims are a hoax, and said he is not looking for belief or for notoriety.

"It's really not important," he said. "The only important thing is that prophetic utterances be fulfilled."

Crotser's group also claims to have discovered the true site of the Tower of Babel and the resting place of Noah's Ark, which was featured in the 1974 film "In Search of Noah's Ark."

David Graf, a professor at the

University of Michigan and associate editor of Biblical Archaeologist magazine, said he was highly skeptical of Crotser's claims.

Crotser said his Institute for Restoring Ancient History International found the Ark of the Covenant in a cave where it had remained untouched for 2,000 years. The Ark, according to the Book of Exodus, is a gold-covered receptacle containing the Ten Commandments.

Unterman said he did not understand why Crotser did not ask qualified scholars from nearby Jerusalem to verify the authenticity of the treasure.

"There are some excellent scholars over there," Unterman said. "Why doesn't he bring them in to verify it? What's he afraid of?"

Jim Bolinger, a member of the expedition that returned a week ago, said the Ark was found in a sealed passageway inside a cave on Mount Pisgah, east of Jerusalem and about 35 miles southwest of Amman, Jordan.

The group did not move the Ark — Bolinger said his first instinct was not to touch it — but will that up to wealthy international banker, David Rothschild.

Crotser said before leaving his two-week expedition that the Ark is part of the plan set up in the Book of Revelations. He said the Ark would restore the Temple of Jerusalem so that all may be in order in the Second Coming of Christ, which he predicted would occur in September or October of 1988.

Zirconium exporter facing charges for shipping metal

NEW YORK — The U.S. Commerce Department will lodge charges against an exporter who allegedly tried to ship 5,000 pounds of the metal zirconium, used as shielding in nuclear reactors, to Pakistan.

Pakistan is believed to be developing nuclear weapons. The shipment, packed in 15 crates and marked as mountain-climbing equipment, was seized Oct. 31 at Kennedy Airport as it was about to be loaded aboard a Pakistan Airlines jet bound for Islamabad.

The Commerce Department identified the shipper as National-Tronics Corp. of New York City and the intended recipient as Dr.

Sarfraz Mir, a retired Pakistani army colonel who is reported to be a confidant of Pakistan President Mohammad Zia ul-Haq.

Albert Goldberg, president of National-Tronics, refused comment.

Dennis Murphy, spokesman for the U.S. Customs Service, said the 5,000 pounds of zirconium, a light metal that restricts the bombardment of neutrons and, as such, prevents nuclear reaction, had been removed to a secure location to await action by the Commerce Department and possibly the Justice Department.

William Cunningham, assistant U.S. attorney for the Eastern District in Brooklyn, who is handling

the zirconium case, refused to discuss the matter.

But Daniel Landa, a spokesman for the Commerce Department in Washington, said the department would bring administrative charges against National-Tronics for seeking to ship the zirconium overseas without an export license.

Zirconium, because of its use in nuclear development, is a restricted commodity that can be shipped abroad only with specific permission of the federal government.

No such permission was obtained, Landa said, and the Commerce Department ordered the material confiscated.
