LUBBOCK—The rock musical
"Rocky Horror Picture Show"
may never be shown to Lubbock
audiences again because of egg
and bottle tossing incidents by
theater patrons at a recent mid-
night showing, a theater manager
said.

Bob Lewandowski, manager of
the Fox Four theater, said Mon-
day he had heard about such be-
havior at the movie in the past, but
said he did not think it would hap-
pen at his theater.

"There's no way we'll ever book
the 'Rocky Horror Picture Show'
in this area," he said.

The movie—a rock musical
about a young couple that seeks
refuge from a storm in the mys-
terious house of Dr. Frank-N-
Furter—has attracted a cult fol-
lowing throughout the country.

It was scheduled to run as a
midnight feature at the theater for
four days ending last Saturday,
but Lewandowski cancelled the
booking after the first perform-
ance.

Barely 10 minutes into the
Wednesday showing, theater pat-
rons began pelting a doorman with
eggs as he patrolled the aisles.
Lewandowski said he went to the
front of the theater, where a beer
bottle and a soft drink bottle were
thrown, crashing next to him on
the floor.

Although the screen was not
hit, he said the egg throwing con-
tinued through most of the movie.
"We did not let people sit on
the first ten rows from the screen,
so the screen would be better pro-
tected," Lewandowski said. "I did
not mind the rice and squirt bot-
tles—the things people usually
bring to Rocky Horror—but it got
violent."

At one point, a doorman and a
customer tried to remove another
customer who had squirted the
doorman with water. A fight en-
sued and an entire row of custom-
ers was ejected from the theater.
But when the group reached the
lobby, the fight broke out again
between the same two customers,
and Lewandowski called the police.

However, he said he did not
press charges.

"I'd already decided by then to
cancel the movie and I just didn't
want any more hassels," he said.
"I told the police to make sure
they (the ejected customers) never
left the premises."

Several years ago, patrons nearly
destroyed the South Plains
Cinema during a showing of the
movie. In that incident, seats
were ripped, bathroom stalls were
torn from the wall, glass in the
front door was kicked out and the
manager was assaulted.

Reagan: Social Security secure

WASHINGTON—President
Reagan said Tuesday he wrongly
has been portrayed as "an enemy
of my own generation" and prom-
ised delegates to the White House
Conference on Aging that Social
Security can and will be saved.

The future of Social Security
has been the target of "political
demagoguery and outright false-
hood," Reagan, 70, said in an
address on the problems of older
Americans.

The president's speech fol-
lowed a vote by a conference com-
mittee on Social Security to
oppose the use of general tax re-

venues to shore up the sagging
retirement fund.

Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla.,
said he may urge delegates to vote
against the conference's final re-
commendations if the Social
Security resolution is rejected.

Pepper, who was applauded for
the opening session Monday in
arguing against benefit cuts, said
the committee's vote was a "very
unfortunate thing for elderly peo-
ple in the country."

"It makes it more difficult for
those of us in the Congress to de-
fend the elderly against cuts,"
Pepper said.

Reagan noted Tuesday that he
pledged during his campaign to
try to restore the integrity of So-
cial Security without penalizing
those dependent on the program.

"I have kept that pledge and I
intend to keep it—both parts
of it," he said. "We will not bet-
ter those entitled to Social Secu-
rity benefits, and we will, indeed,
must, put Social Security on a
sound financial basis."

The president tied the success
of Social Security reform to two
goals of his administration—less
restraint and the elimination of
fraud and abuse in federal spend-
ing—and discussed the economic
climate threatening the program.


"I am not pointing out the
facts because I want to scare any-
one," Reagan said. "What we can
afford is supporting, as disabled
people who are not disabled,
educating from Social Security
funds young people from families
of affluence and wealth."
