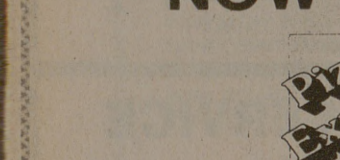

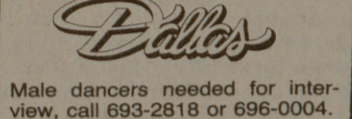

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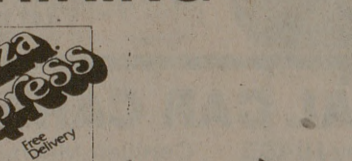

Couple attempts climb to protest nuclear arms

United Press International SAN FRANCISCO — A man and woman were stalled at the ninth-floor level of a downtown office building Tuesday in an attempt to scale the structure in a protest against nuclear arms on the anniversary of musician John Lennon's death.

Edwin Drummond, 36, who made an illegal climb up the Statue of Liberty in May 1980, and Lia Simmacher, 21, from Tucson, Ariz., a student at San Francisco State University, said they wanted to rappel down and were negotiating with the building management.

After their partial ascent of the 41-story Embarcadero One building, the pair unfurled a banner

reading "Imagine no arms." The words match the lyrics of one of Lennon's antiwar songs. The former member of the Beatles rock group was murdered in New York a year ago Tuesday.

Through supporters on the ground, they released a statement saying: "We... are engaged in a peaceful civil demonstration. Our aim, clearly shown by the banner, is to draw attention to nuclear arms, the gravest problem facing human kind."

Drummond, arrested after his successful climb of the Statue of Liberty, was charged with misdemeanor trespassing and placed on probation by New York authorities. His probationary period, during which he was ordered to stage no further climbs, had expired by the time of the San Francisco climb.

Drummond and Simmacher used high quality climbing rope and were attaching it to window washing bolts. Supporters on the ground said they also used a casing device, not a conventional climb tool, which fits into vertical grooves of the buildings.

Assistant Fire Chief Ed Murphy, asked if the couple would be forced down, said, "Absolutely not." Police made no move to force them down.

James Higgins, an Embarcadero Center vice president, said earlier that plans were to leave the couple alone.

"What can you do?" he said. "The best thing is to let them stay there and come down on their own."

A passerby said, "I think they're idiots. They're wasting their lives in a senseless fashion."

Tri-jackers get food, fuel, doctor

United Press International TECUCIGALPA, Honduras — In a triple sky grab of military precision, leftist gunmen commandeered three Venezuelan airliners in and out of five nations, threatening Tuesday to kill up to 200 hostages and demanding \$10 million in ransom.

"We're going to take off, and if you want to feast your eyes on cadavers, that's the way it's going to be if you don't give us fuel," a pilot in Honduras said, prompted by the hijackers. Two of the aircraft then lifted from a darkened runway, their destination undisclosed.

At midnight Monday, hijackers aboard the third plane in Guatemala threatened to shoot their hostages unless the government provided a \$10 million ransom, release of political prisoners in Venezuela and refueling of their jet, airport officials said.

The 30 hijackers — 10 in each plane — seized the planes Monday over Venezuela and coursed through Latin American skies with stops in El Salvador, Honduras, Aruba, Colombia and Guatemala, releasing 108 passengers.

About 270 passengers were initially reported on two DC-9s seized from Aeropostal and a Boeing 727 taken from Aerovenza airlines domestic flights Monday. The gunmen, reportedly armed with explosives and hand grenades, identified themselves variously as Puerto Rican separatists and Salvadoran International

Commandos protesting Venezuela's "support" of the U.S.-backed junta in El Salvador.

The gunmen released 67 people from the two DC-9s and one Boeing 727 in exchange for food and fuel in Barranquilla, Colombia. Others were freed in Aruba and Honduras.

After 20 hostages were released in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, the hijackers ordered all baggage removed from both jetliners to lighten them and make it easier to clear steep mountains near the airport, authorities said.

Several hostages released in Colombia were hospitalized after their nine-hour ordeal in sweltering airplane cabins, where temperatures exceeded 100 degrees. The three planes rendezvoused in Barranquilla after one had flown to the Dutch island of Aruba. The took off from Barranquilla within minutes of each other.

One of the DC-9s stopped for minutes at El Salvador's Ilopango Air Force Base on the eastern edge of San Salvador before landing at Toncontin Airport, Tegucigalpa, capitol of Honduras. The Boeing 727 went to Guatemala City, Guatemala, where it remained Tuesday.

The gunmen gave authorities in Honduras and Guatemala 48 hours to pump 2,000 gallons of fuel into the airplanes, deliver 20 sandwiches and send a doctor for a hostage who apparently has heart trouble, control tower sources said.

Quotas 'needed' to fight injustice

United Press International WASHINGTON — Affirmative action remedies, including the selective quotas, are needed to combat discrimination, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights said Tuesday.

In a report to President Reagan, the commission opposed quotas that "derive from prejudice and exist to stigmatize entire groups," but said they are needed to end discriminatory processes and make equal opportunity a reality.

It said sexual and racial discrimination is far more entrenched than affirmative action critics contend and that "such discrimination will not yield to remedies that are premised on ignoring its existence."

The report was issued as the Reagan administration appeared to be stepping up its effort to dismantle many of the civil rights efforts of the past two decades and oust commission chairman Arthur Flemming.

"The only effective remedy is affirmative action which responds to discrimination as a self-sustaining process and dismantles it," the commission said.

In the 56-page report, "Affirma-

tive Action in the 1980s: Dismantling the process of Discrimination," the commission recommended a "problem remedial approach to affirmative action that uses the nature and extent of the diagnosed discriminatory problem as the basis for choosing among possible remedies."

But it made clear that in some instances those remedies must include not only the use of numerical goals but quotas as well.

"Failure to accurately characterize discrimination leads to portrayals of affirmative action as unnecessary or drastic remedies the commission told Reagan.

"The courts sharply disagree with these attacks," it added. "Charged with interpreting national civil rights law and policy, the judiciary has repeatedly found measures that take race, sex and national origin into account to be indispensable remedies for discrimination."

It said critics of affirmative action "frequently misread the country's history of race, sex and national origin discrimination and consistently minimize the nature and extent of present day discrimination."
