

Aggie dives into Hawaiian triathlon

A race including 2.4 miles of swimming, 112 miles of bicycling and a marathon could only

be called The Original Ironman World Triathlon. And there aren't many people who could do it.
Shirley Hill, Class of '80 and

former All-American swimmer for Texas A&M University, will travel to the island of Hawaii to compete in the Feb. 6 Triathlon.

"I'm doing it because I want to — just like shaving my head," Hill said. Hill shaved her head for the national Association of Interscholastic Athletics for Women swimming championships in 1980. "Ten years down the road I don't want to look back and say 'Damn, why didn't I do that?'"


The California native first became interested in the triathlon when Tom Warren, a well-known swimmer in California won the first race in 1978.

Hill's straining includes running four to five miles every morning and biking about 16 miles every evening. Because the land around College Station is so flat, she also rides her bike up the ramps at Kyle Field.

"It's more challenging than when I was just going to school and swimming," Hill said. "Now when I work it's straight eight hours and I'm beat."

Hill said she hasn't been swimming as much as she would like, but believes she can rely on past swimming experience.

"Comparatively, it's a lot easier for me as a former swimmer to pick up biking or run-
