### Plane crash kills seven

LAREDO — Seven people
were killed when a twin-engine NSURAND private airplane plunged 75 feet AGGIES: into an area between two runways at Laredo International

Airport on the return from its

first trip with a new owner.

The Cessna 402 crashed in clear and sunny weather at 9:43 a.m. Sunday and burst into flames on impact, authorities said. Firefighters removed the burned bodies of four women and three men about 15 minutes after the fire was extinguished. Department of Public Safety officials identified the victims as the pilot, Robert Joseph Brandt, 45, of Angleton; Vernon Lee Meyer, 46, of Oyster Creek; his wife, Shirley Keller Meyer, 45; Jo Ann Graf, 40, of Dilley; her

son, Larry Graf, 20, of Dilley; his wife, Donna Graf, 17; and Sheila Zachary Terrant, 36, of Lake

Charter aircraft company employee Roger Garcia, who witnessed the crash, said the plane was on a landing approach from the north when it lost power in one engine, hit nose-down, exploded and burned.

Scott Stephens, a pilot from Beeville, said he saw the approach from his car as he and his wife, Liz, drove just outside the airport perimeter, and knew the plane was in trouble.

Stephens, who saw the plane approaching the airport, said, it was coming in slow for a twinengine plane. For a plane that large, he said, it was barely flying.


