Aggie Ladies thump TSU; tourney next

The Aggie Ladies knocked off Texas Southern University Tuesday night 59-55 to gain their second straight win and more important, a much-needed shot of confidence as they open play tonight in the Southwest Conference tournament.

A crowd of 2,000 that eventually grew to over 7,000 watched Texas A&M erase a 26-25 halftime deficit with several key steals and some inspired play from the bench. Junior post Cathy Foreman, who did not play in the first half, scored 13 points in the second and gave

the Aggies' inside game a new look.

The Ladies assumed a 6-0 lead and continued to put distance between themselves and the Tigers, upping the lead to 14-6 midway through the first half. A seven-point surge by TSU, however, put the Tigers on top 22-17 later in the period.

TSU came up empty on its next three trips down the court, and the Aggie Ladies responded by taking a 25-24 lead with less than a minute left in the half. A Carlette Moore basket with six seconds left turned it around again, and the Tigers went to the locker room with a one-point lead.

But Kelley Sullivan and Romy Gandy, who had a combined total of five steals, helped Foreman revive Texas A&M's offense. With just under 10 minutes left, the Aggies led by a 42-41 margin.

The Tigers came back briefly, but a Kelly Krauskopf basket put Texas A&M on top for good, and Foreman's five free throws sealed the victory for the Aggies.

Roberta Harper keyed TSU's attack with 25 points and 11 rebounds, followed by Darlene Hale with 15 points and Moore with 10. High scorer for the Aggies was Sullivan, who had 14 points and seven rebounds on the night. Krauskopf finished with 10 points.

The Aggie Ladies, now 6-13, host the nine-team SWC tournament starting tonight when they play at 6:30 against Texas Christian University. Arkansas faces Texas Tech in the second game tonight at 8:30.

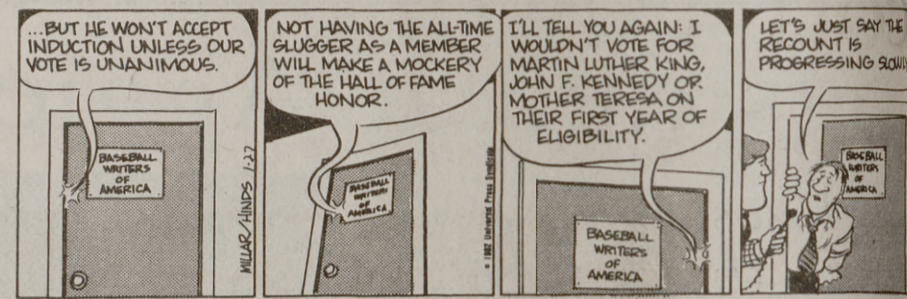

A&M transfer student wins tennis tournament

Arnold Kettenacker may be a hard name to pronounce, but it's one that will be well-known on the tennis courts of college campuses next fall.

Razorbacks came alive and the Aggies died.

Alvin Robertson, Walker, Ricky Norton and Carey Kelly hit jumpers to pull Arkansas to within 49-42 with 12:07 left. Although Naulls hit a free throw to raise the lead to eight, Walker completed a three-point play to make the score 50-45 with 9:24 remaining.

At the 7:44 mark, Walker hit a short jumper from the left baseline to narrow the Texas A&M lead to 50-49. But after scoring only one point on the 6:39 mark, the Aggies started connecting. Texas A&M increased its lead

to 57-49 on a three-point play by Woods, and successive baskets by Riley and Roberts. With only 2:19 left, the Aggies still lead 61-54, but the Razorbacks tied the game 62-62 on Walker's steal from Roberts and the following dunk with 24 seconds to go.

Roberts said after the game that he thought he was fouled on the play.

"I got fouled, and I really thought they were going to call it," Roberts said. "You never can tell how they're going to call it... but I did think I got fouled on the hand."

After a timeout, Lewis rebounded the ball to Woods, who tried to dribble and was fouled by Hastings. As Hastings went to

the bench after fouling Woods took his crucial free throw line.
