Fewer quakes caused fewer deaths in 1981

United Press International GOLDEN, Colo. — The U.S. Geological Survey says the number of earthquakes worldwide declined last year as compared to 1980, and fewer people died as a result

The USGS National Earthquake Information Service said Tuesday only two significant earthquakes occurred in the Unwith 11 in 1980. Earthquakes caused no U.S. deaths in 1981.

Waverly Person, NEIS geophysicist, said the last quake-related death in the United States was on Nov. 29, 1975, when two people died in a tidal wave caused by a 7.2-magnitude earthquake in Hawaii.

Worldwide, there were 50 significant earthquakes

There were 12 earthquakes throughout the world with magnitudes of 7.0 or more in 1981. far below the average of 19.
