



The Senate also will present an award to Vice President for Planning Charles H. Samson Jr. The Senate Finance Commit-

tee has reviewed budget requests from each of the student services, such as the A.P. Beutel Health Center, the Personal Counseling Service and the MSC Council and Directorate.

The nine student services re-quested a total of \$3,019,613 for 1982-83. The Finance Committee will recommend approval of a total budget of \$2,863,713. Six bills will be introduced:

- Revision of the Constitution for the Student Body of **Texas A&M** — calls for the Rules and Regulations Committee to recommend changes in the University Constitution. These changes must be approved by the Senate and a majority vote in a student referendum. - Dead Week Library Bill -


