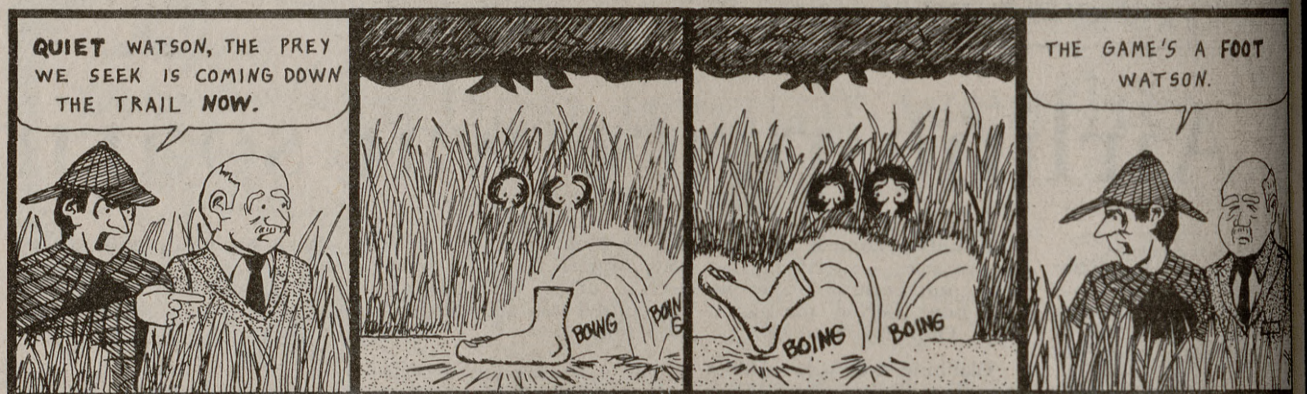

**Employees abused,  
juvenile system  
official says**

SAND SPRINGS, Okla. — Adults working in the state's juvenile system are abused far more than the youngsters they care for, the superintendent of a child care center said Thursday.

The youths have violent backgrounds and resist attempts to undergo changes in their lifestyles, leading to confrontations with supervisors and counselors, said Herschell Daney, superintendent of the L.E. Rader Diagnostic, Evaluation and Treatment Center.

"We're trying to change lives, and therefore you have to have confrontations to have changes," Daney said. "They come here angry. They're mad at the courts, at their parents. They've been kicked out of school."

At least 60 employees at the center have been injured by students since November 1980, he said.

Published reports about abuses of youngsters in the system are misleading, since they are based on isolated incidents and ignore the physical treatment of adults, he said.

Meanwhile, at Taft, official accused of ignoring charges of prostitution and drug abuse, the Oklahoma Children's Center say they conducted their investigation last fall and subsequently fired two employees.

Wilbur Williams, superintendent of the juvenile home, and Security Chief Nathan Alexander Jr. and recreation supervisor Gary Warrior were fired Monday, the day after a series of stories by Gannett News Service on child abuse, drug peddling and prostitution began in newspapers in nearby Muskogee.

Alexander was accused of soliciting a young girl for prostitution and Warrior was accused of allowing inmates to grow marijuana about 10 blocks from the center, which houses 85 deprived and nondelinquent youngsters, the news service said.

**Reagan aid resigns  
following charges**

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department is reviewing financial matters involving Joseph Canzeri, who resigned Wednesday as a top White House aide.

Canzeri has denied any wrongdoing, but in a letter to President Reagan said his resignation was in the best interest of the Reagan administration.

A White House spokesman said the Justice Department was investigating both Canzeri's acceptance of below-market terms for financing a \$380,000 townhouse and a pair of double billings for travel expenses.

"I'm not accused of anything, but I don't want to live in this environment," Canzeri said. "I'd be ineffective."

Canzeri had wide responsibility for scheduling and travel arrangements in the Reagan administration. He was deputy assistant to the president and assistant to the deputy chief of staff, Michael Deaver.

Canzeri had a massive presence at the White House. Canzeri's strongest talent was being able to get things accomplished in a hurry.

In accepting Canzeri's resignation, Reagan wrote: "Over the last year and a half, you have served not just me but our nation with distinction, honor and a personal energy that knows few parallels."

Canzeri said an investigation of the billing irregularities by White House counsel Fred Fielding cleared him of any wrongdoing. But he said he did not want to be a "drag on a lot of people."

The White House had no comment on the Fielding investigation.

As for the housing loan, Canzeri, one-time aide to the late Nelson Rockefeller, received financial assistance from Rockefeller's brother Laurance and California developer, Donald Koll.

The New York Times reported Wednesday that Laurance Rockefeller loaned Canzeri \$200,000 at 9 percent interest under terms that do not require him to make any payments this time.

Canzeri borrowed another \$200,000 from Koll at 12 percent interest, on which he is required to make any principal payments until July 1985. Both loans were made to Canzeri on 31.

"It's a loan, it's not a gift," Canzeri said in confirming the report. "I'm not in a policy position and not in a position to do anything" at the White House for the lenders, he said.

The Washington Post reported Thursday that the White House audit found Canzeri charged expenses for two trips both to the White House and the Republican National Committee.

It said one of the trips involved a group dinner in San Diego on March 29, when Canzeri was making preparations for a trip to Mexico by Reagan. The other was a dinner in Paris when he was advancing a trip to Vice President George Bush.

Canzeri said the \$800 irregularity turned up during routine audit of some double billings for official travel.

"When I heard about it, I was shocked," he said.

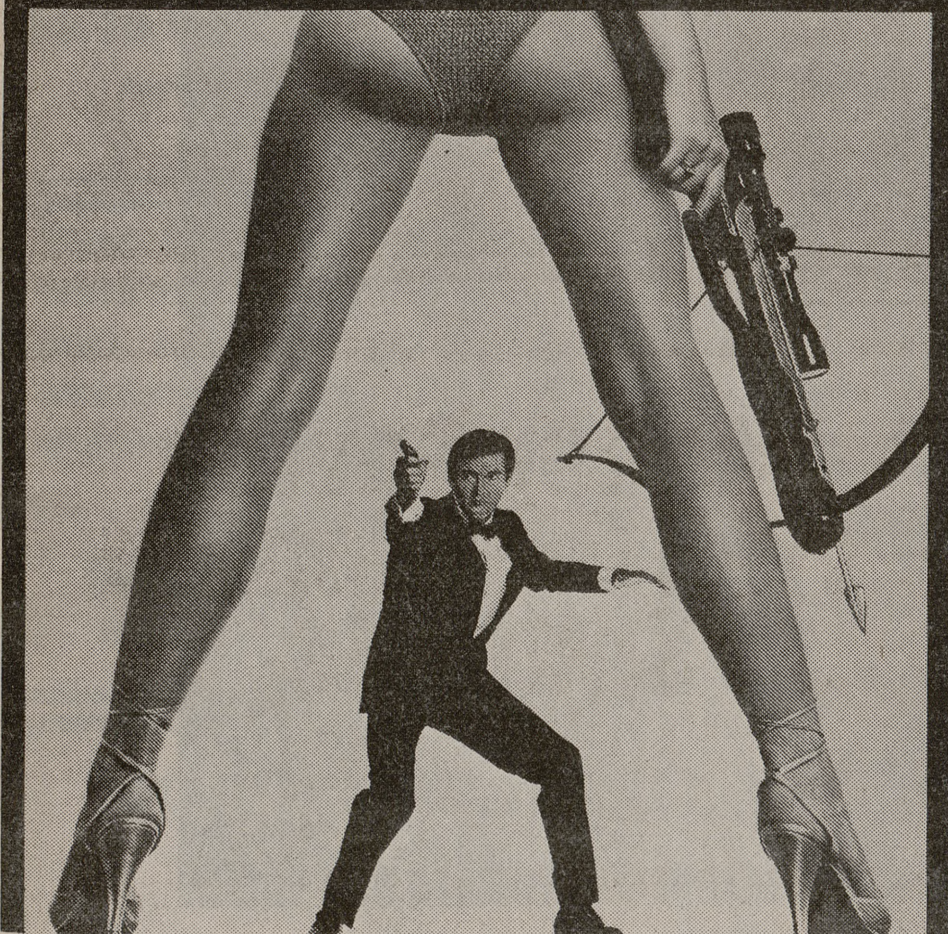
