Claude Riley finished with 18 points. Naulls said his teammates, several of whom have played at Arkansas before, have filled him in on the dangers of Fayetteville. Naulls, a first-year transfer from UCLA, has never played on Arkansas' home court.

"They gave me the rundown on it," Naulls said. "There's nothing like first-hand experience, though, so I don't think anyone could have told me enough."

"I hope I don't get hit with anything," he laughed.

Naulls credited the Owls for their effort Saturday night.

"I think they came out and played the game they had planned," Naulls said. "We hit our free throws (26 of 34 for the game) and that really helped a lot."

"We knew Ricky was going to get his—we just wanted to make it hard on him. You can't stop a man like Pierce totally, so we just had to work hard and make him earn everything he got."

Rice coach Tommy Suits, four of whose starters fouled out

during the second half of the game, said: "I don't think anyone watching the game thought we played any more aggressive in the second half than in the first half. I thought both teams played well... I just think we got a bad deal (on the 28 team fouls). I don't think that decided the game, though—A&M just played a good game."

Tonight's game will be played amid controversy over the incidents which occurred at the Arkansas-Texas game in Fayetteville Feb. 6. Razorback guard Darrell Walker was ejected from the game for hitting Texas' Ray Harper, while scuffles took place between Longhorn coach Abe Lemons, his players and Arkansas fans after the game.

The Southwest Conference said Sunday that it would need more time before a decision can be made on the incident involving Walker's ejection. The 6-4 guard scored 24 points in the Razorbacks' 64-63 victory over the Aggies Jan. 26, hitting a 21-foot jumper at the buzzer to shock 7,726 G. Rollie White Coliseum spectators.

"Kelly played a good defensive game, and played well on the boards," Rapp said.

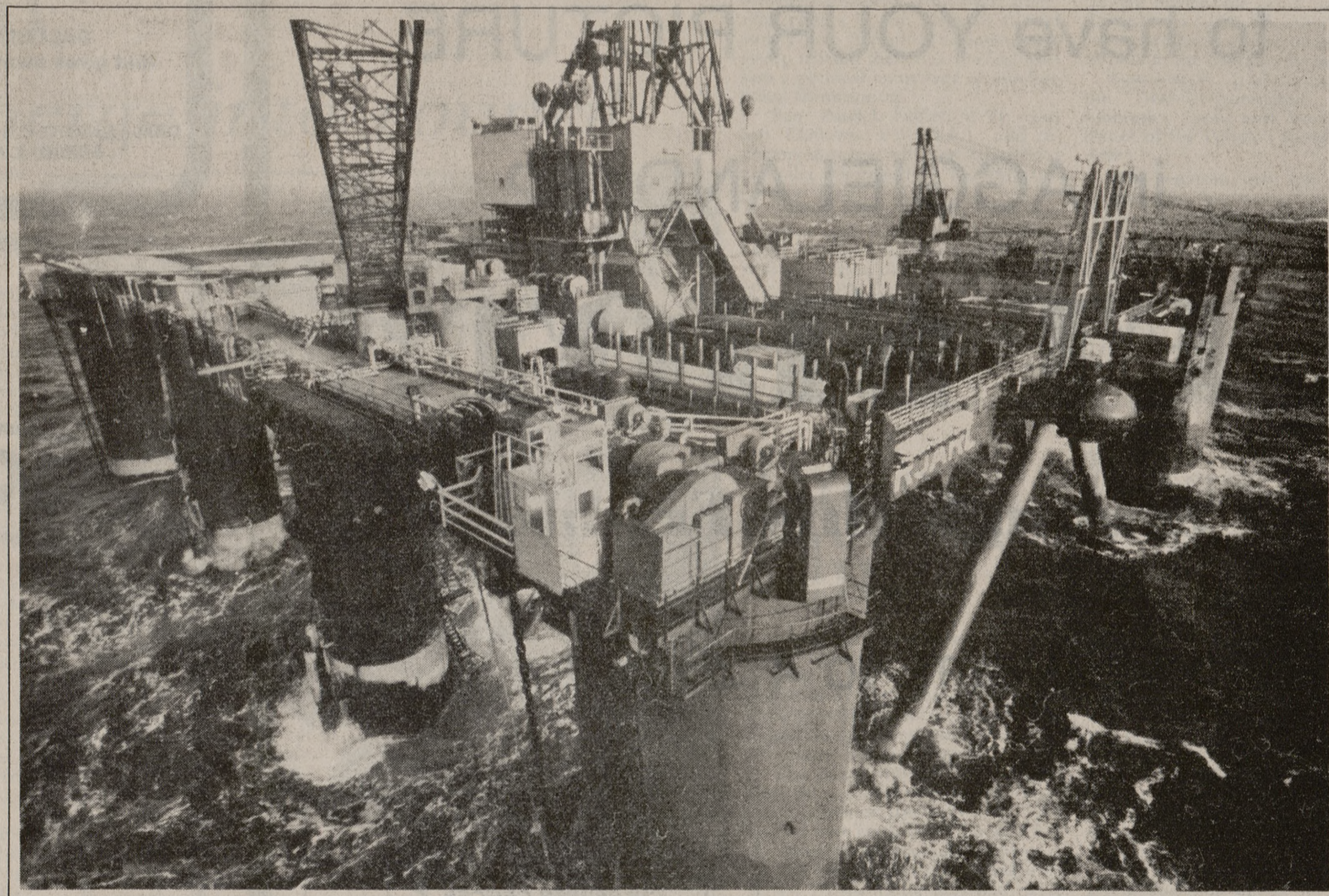
"We played a good first half defensively, but then we made
