Local gas prices fall, dealers blame surplus

Local gasoline prices have fal-len sharply in the last few weeks, and at least one dealer predicts prices could drop below \$1 a gallon within two months.

Sam Labarera, manager of Burley's Gulf in Bryan, said if current trends continue, the price of gas could fall to 90 cents gallon. Prices have already dropped three times in the last two weeks, he said.

The most recent price reduction was Tuesday, LaBarera said, when regular leaded gas went from \$1.17 to \$1.15. Unleaded regular is now \$1.20 — a 4-cent reduction - and unleaded super went from \$1.30 to

"Prices should go down again before Friday", he said.

LaBarera attributes the current reduction in gas prices to a
