Wall Street bombed by terrorist group

NEW YORK — The New York Stock Exchange opened at the usual time Monday in spite of a bombing that took place late Sunday. The Puerto Rican terrorist group FALN has taken credit for the blasts.

The American stock exchange and two other buildings also were damaged.

A letter left near the bomb site said the explosions were made to protest "Yankee imperialism."

The explosions came one day before the 28th anniversary of the March 1, 1954, attack by Puerto Rican nationalists on the U.S. House in which five congressmen were wounded by gunfire.

The explosions came in a 30-minute span and caused no injuries. The buildings suffered only broken glass and minor structural damage, police said.

The FALN, dedicated to independence for Puerto Rico, claimed responsibility for the bombings in a multi-page communique that police found in a telephone booth about 6 miles north of Wall Street.

Police Sgt. Edward Leschack said the first explosion occurred at 11:25 p.m. at the headquarters of the Merrill Lynch stock brokerage. Ten minutes later,

bombs exploded at the headquarters of Chase Manhattan bank and at the New York Stock Exchange a few blocks away. The last blast went off at 11:55 p.m. at the American Stock Exchange.

High-powered explosives — possibly dynamite — were used in the bombs, he said.

Witnesses said a late model four-door car crammed with people was seen speeding from the area moments after the blasts.

Shortly after the bombing, police said, a news agency reported it received a telephone call from a man claiming to be an FALN representative who directed police to an envelope in a telephone booth. The anonymous caller did not mention the blasts.

Police recovered the letter, which they described as "a typical FALN communique." Patrick Murphy, the Police Department's chief of operations, said the letter mentioned the bombings and declared "imperialistic forces" opposing statehood for Puerto Rico.

The FALN communique said the bombings were to protest "Yankee imperialism," Murphy said.

"The FALN assumes full responsibility for the bombings

which have occurred financial sector of Wall Sunday, Feb. 28, 1982," line of the multi-page communique read. Police to publicize the rest.

The FALN — Armadas De Liberacion al" (Armed Forces for Liberation) — is a radical ethnic Puerto Rican group in the United States dedicated to independence for Puerto Rico from the States.

Since 1974, the FALN claimed responsibility for 120 bombings in the New York City area, Chicago, Washington. Five people were killed, four of them a bomb went off at New York's historic Fraunces Tavern January 1975. Last month FALN planted five bombs around the city, including the U.S. Mission to the Nations.

The message also expressed solidarity with radicals in last October's bungled armored car robbery in N.Y., in which two police officers and a guard were killed. Police have charged members of the Underground and the Liberation Army with the killings.

Cancer cause found in Rutgers classroom

NEWARK, N.J. — The abnormally high incidence of cancer among occupants of a classroom building on the Rutgers University Newark campus has baffled scientists for two years.

But the recent discovery of traces of an estrogen hormone — common in some types of birth control pills — may provide a key to the mystery.

The National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health reported Feb. 11 that it found traces of a hormone called estradiol benzoate in air samples taken in September at Smith Hall.

Rutgers President Edward Bloustein closed the four-story complex — the largest classroom building on campus — the same day.

The NIOSH report said the hormone levels found in several classrooms were higher than the accepted industrial standard. The hormone is known to cause cancer in mice and is suspected of causing uterine cancer in women.

The hormone had been mixed that September day in the top floor labs of the Institute of Animal Behavior for experiments on animal ovulation cycles.

The 14-year-old building has been a source of controversy

since 1980, when employees began complaining of an unusually high incidence of cancer and other ailments including recurrent headaches, dizziness, nausea and fatigue.

Rutgers renovated the hall's ventilation system and eliminated unsanitary sewage leaks from the IAB labs, but extensive tests by state and federal experts failed to pinpoint any significant health hazards — until now.

A year-long study by the state Health Department in October found a "significant excess" of cancer among the building's occupants, but no common source that could be linked to Smith Hall.

Of the 436 people surveyed, eight had contracted cancer. But the five different types of cancers found left the scientists puzzled.

In January, a psychology student died of lymph cancer.

Since the closing, a new set of air tests has been taken. Results are expected within weeks. They will be analyzed for four types of hormones — IAB's maternal and sexual behavior studies.

Bloustein said he is awaiting the test results to plot the next move in an unhappy situation.

If hormones are present, the future use of the building will depend on whether can be learned how they got from the lab to the room.

While the building has closed, the experiment continues. But researchers have been forbidden from more hormones.
