### No ruling for a week on Rocket's ejection

United Press International HOUSTON — A ruling is not expected from the league office for at least a week on the Houston Rockets protest that referee Mike Mathis improperly ejected Elvin Hayes from a game against the San Antonio Spurs. Joe Axelson, National Bas-

ketball Association vice presi-dent of operations, said he re-ceived the official protest from the Rockets late Wednesday. If upheld, the Rockets could replay a Tuesday game in which the San Antonio Spurs beat them 119-117.

Mathis ejected Hayes with 1:48 left in the first half after calling a technical foul on him. The basis of the Rockets claim is that normally it takes two technical fouls to cause ejection.

"I want to investigate the en-tire thing for myself," Axelson said, "and I want to look at the game films before making any kind of judgment." Rockets officials mailed a let-

ter of explanation, the game films and the required \$1,500 to Axelson to initiate the protest. Rockets General Manager Ray Patterson said Mathis told
