Aggies host Sooners today

The Texas Aggie baseball team, 21-8 for the season and 3-5 in the Southwest Confer-

ence, hosts the Oklahoma Sooners in a double-header today at 5:30 at Olsen Field.

Coach Tom Chandler says the team's pitching staff, which gave up 20 runs to the TCU Horned Frogs in three games over the weekend, must be more consistent.

"We're experiencing a little difficulty pitching-wise," Chandler said. "Our eight position players have been playing well. They've made a few errors, but they've done a good job. We're scoring runs — it's just

that the pitchers need to hold them."

The Sooners, who defeated Hawaii three of five games earlier in the season when the Rainbows were ranked No. 3 in the nation, have a 16-9 record.

"They've got traditionally an outstanding college baseball club," Chandler said. "We're expecting one of our biggest crowds of the season."

They added their second run in the eighth inning when rookie outfielder Eddie Milner doubled to left and scored on Dave Concepcion's single.


Pastore went the first six innings for the victory, the Reds' 11th against nine losses.

Aggie gymnasts second in TGC championships

The Texas A&M gymnastics team placed second in the con-

ference championship meet Saturday in Lubbock, finishing with a 202.95 score.

Texas Tech won the Texas Gymnastics Conference Championships with a 229.9, ending Texas' three-year domination of the meet.

Texas finished third with 194.35 and UTA was fourth with 191.5.

"We feel real good about the finish," team co-captain Mark Hartwell said. "It was a big change-up this season and we finished better than we ever had before."

David Semon led the team, placing sixth in the all-around competition. A hand injury forced him to withdraw from parallel bar and high bar com-

petition. Hartwell placed second in the floor exercises and vault and fifth on the rings and parallel bars. Ray Moltz took fourth place honors on the pommel horse and Jim Foght was sixth on the rings.

The team selected freshman Marty Hardell as its gymnast of the meet because of his contributions to the team, although he did not place in the finals.

Hardell qualified for the finals in the floor exercises and the vault, though, and co-captain Jim Gill earned a berth on the parallel bars.

The Aggies end the season with three first-place finishes and three second-place finishes in competition.

Every American is painfully aware of double digit inflation and rising costs, but would you believe \$28,000 for a bottle of wine? This was the price recently paid for a bottle of Lafite 1806, purchased at a wine auction by a Syracuse, NY wine merchant. It was undoubtedly the most expensive bottle of wine ever purchased anywhere in the world. This costly bottle of rare vintage was later enjoyed by an enthusiastic assemblage of 18 Oenophiles, each donating the tidy sum of \$1,500 to the Central New York Chapter of the National Arthritis Foundation for the privilege of participating in an elaborate uncorking ceremony. Despite the fact that the wine had been made in the parish of Pauillac, France, 173 years ago and probably reached its prime about 150 years ago, it still conveyed the taste of the Sauvignon grapes and had not totally disintegrated due to its age. This week at Randy's we will have on display a 1928 Chateau Margeaux, one of the finest wines ever bottled in France or any other country of the world.
