### Scientist: Cancer cure works

United Press International DAYTONA BEACH — An Italian researcher says his team produced a near-total cure rate in a group of advanced cancer patients by alternating a standard treatment with a new combination of drugs.

The most effective known director of the National Tumor

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

Cave experts flown in from Pittsburgh to help in the rescue operation said victims in such situations often die from exposure to sub-freezing temperatures, to which Weltner was subjected for two nights.

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
