

## Crime program focuses on burglary in April

Burglary occurs every two minutes in Texas, leaving losses that cannot be replaced. In Texas, burglary rings account for \$245 million worth of stolen goods annually, an average loss of \$966 a home.

Crime prevention is one answer to this growing problem. The simple act of locking one's home before leaving reduces the chance of burglary by 20 percent. Asking your neighbor to check up your newspaper and to turn household lights on at in-



tervals when you are away from home also can deter a prospective burglar.

The Governor's Crime Stoppers Advisory Council is doing its part to see that criminals who

make their living by stealing from others are put where they belong — behind bars.

For the month of April, the Crime Stoppers Advisory Council is focusing its statewide "Crime of the Month" program on burglary. Any citizen having information about burglary is asked to call the anti-crime hotline at 1-800-252-TIPS.

Cash rewards are available for information leading to arrest and indictment of these criminals.

## One tie, one eight-vote margin in close College Station races

Saturday's College Station school board elections proved the old adage that every vote counts when one race finished in a tie and only eight votes separated the leaders in the other.

In position 1, incumbent Ann Jones and challenger Chuck Giammona deadlocked at 928 votes after a recount. Initial returns showed them tied with 930 votes.

Position 2 incumbent Herman Brown only held an eight-

vote advantage over his top challenger, Texas A&M professor Joe Templeton.

Brown, also a University professor, received 756 votes (41.97 percent), and Templeton had

748 votes, (41.53 percent). The race's third candidate, Carol Morris, received 297 votes, (16.5 percent).

College Station City Council races were not as close, but did

hold one surprise.

Texas A&M professor Jim Dozier, a 12-year veteran of the council, was defeated by a 904-758 margin by homemaker Lynn Nemeck in the Place 6 race.

## Pearson endorsed by OCA

Off Campus Aggies' executive committee voted Sunday night to endorse Pat Pearson for student body president.

About 18 students attended the meeting in Rudder Tower. Candidates Pearson and Mike Lawshe discussed their ideas and then answered questions from committee members.

The committee voted 11-4 to endorse Pearson. Only members of the executive committee — OCA officers and apartment council presidents — were allowed to vote.

Pearson, a junior political sci-

ence major from San Antonio, stressed improvement in teaching and leadership in Student Government.

"We need good teachers who can speak English ... and we need to reward them with tenure and salary raises," he said. "And we need leadership which can steer the Student Senate into consideration of issues which are important to the student body."

Lawshe, a junior industrial engineering major from Dallas, said his main concerns are communication with students and preservation of the Permanent University Fund.

"Student Government has done good things for the student body, but it has not communicated them effectively," he said. "One of our biggest issues for next year will be saving the PUF ... It's going to be in big trouble at the next meeting of the Legislature (in 1983)."

## Housing applications available

Students currently living in residence halls may sign up to live on campus during summer school today through April 16.

Applications are available in the Housing Office, and housing is guaranteed for all who apply. Applications also will be accepted during summer school

registration.

The summer school application is a space acceptance card. Hall assignments will not be mailed, but may be picked up in the Housing Office beginning May 30 for the first summer session and July 7 for the second session.

Students who complete applications must cancel by May 10 for the first summer session or by June 20 for the second session. This cancellation must be made in person or in writing to the Housing Office. Failure to cancel will result in a forfeiture

of deposit and a cancellation of fall reservation.

A limited number of private rooms will be available on the fourth floor of the Commons. Requests for private rooms will be honored as long as allotted space is available.

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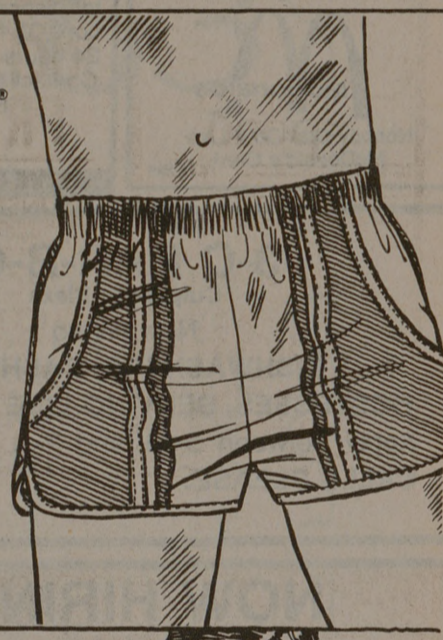


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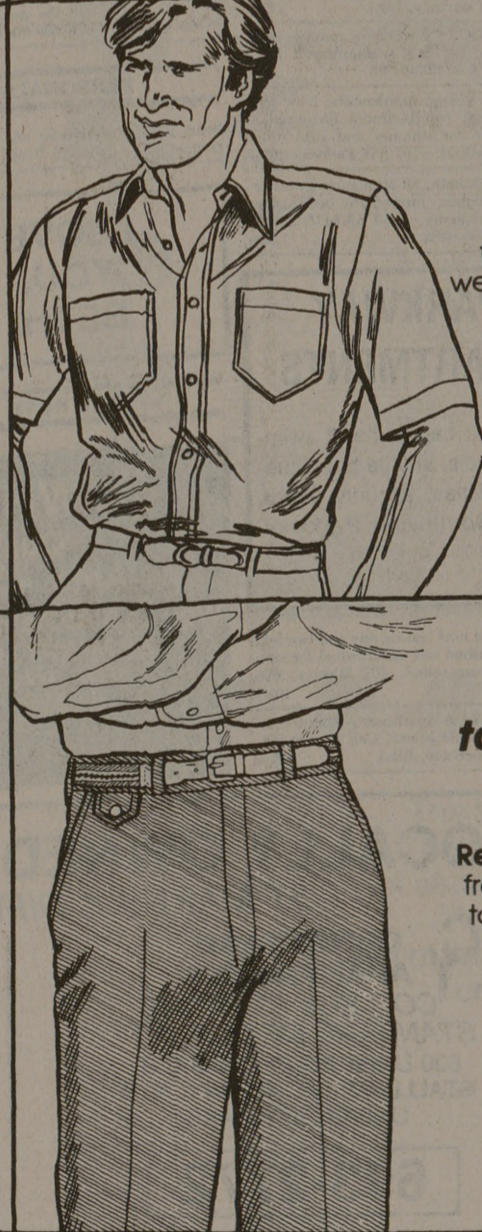
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
