Bench, 34, is beginning his ause "I want to end my 15th major-league season with the Reds. He is virtually assured of being elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame when he becomes eligible five years after retirement, because of his brilliant catching and power hitting. He now plays third base and is concentrating on hitting for a high average, rather than sheer slug-

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Bench, whose current five-year contract expires at the end of this season, declined to say exactly how much he will make from the new deal that covers the 1983-1985 seasons, but insisted it wasn't a blockbuster

"This is not a Dave Winfield, Mike Schmidt, or a Gary Carter not contract," Bench said, referring to astronomical salaries those players earn. "But it's more than I ever imagined. It suits my

Still, Bench hinted his future salary will approach \$1 million

Asked if he will be the highest paid Reds' player, Bench said,

"I'm among the top two."
The highest-paid Red is believed to be shortstop Dave Concepcion, who recently signed a long-term contract that re-portedly pays him \$960,000 per

But Bench said his new contract is not "guaranteed."

"I didn't ask for a guaranteed contract," he said. "If I can't produce and earn my money, then I

Bench also said he didn't want to become a free agent, even though other clubs probably would pay him more than the

Asked if he expected this to be the last contract he signs, which would mean retirement at the end of 1985, Bench said, "I hope

"Pete Rose is still playing and he's what — 56 years old," Bench said with a laugh.


Rose, who will be 41 this month, wants to keep playing at least another three seasons so he can break Ty Cobb's career hit

"I would like to get Cobb's re-cord," chuckled Bench, "or Rose's record, if he gets it." When Bench does retire, he

said he'd like to work part-time for the Reds, helping develop young players at spring training and in the minor leagues.

"We've talked with Johnny about doing some work for the Reds when he quits playing," said Reds' President Dick
