happen again tonight.' On Tiesday evening the Jazz clobbered Dallas in Salt Lake City, 129-114, with Adrian Dantley scoring his normal 40 points against the Mavericks.

Twenty-four hours later the same two teams stumbled into each other at Reunion Arena and the results were quite different. Dallas not only ran away from the Jazz, 123-109, but Dantley was held to the unusual-


