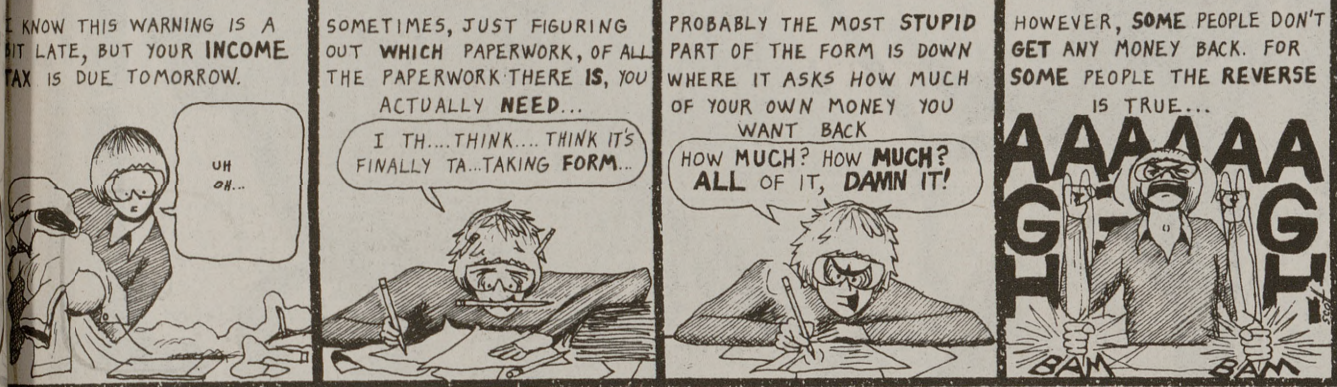

Mock trial to inform managers, dwellers

A mock court trial designed to inform apartment owners and managers of legal aspects on running apartment complexes will be held at 7:30 p.m. today at the Ramada Inn North.

The trial is sponsored by the Texas Apartment Association and will feature two attorneys from the Bryan-College Station area in a landlord-tenant case involving either eviction or money owed by the tenant. The exact case has yet not been determined.

Rene Sledge, assistant manager of Willow Oaks Apartments, said the mock trial will be important since there are several potential problems in a landlord-tenant relationship.

"Sometimes people get angry when they are given an apartment which, in their opinion, is uninhabitable, or they don't get back their full deposit when they leave," she said.

Sledge said landlords also have problems when a tenant refuses to leave after being

evicted, or refuses to pay rent. "The trial will be very important," she said, "particularly to apartment owners who are not

kept up to date. As a manager, I have never been to court and am unaware of the procedure, so it will help me very much too."

The trial will be open to all members of the B-CS chapter of the TAA and to various businesses associated with local apartment complexes. A dinner will precede the trial.

A&M recruiting heavy in Texas high schools

Texas A&M University, like other universities, is spending time and money to recruit students.

The Texas A&M University Office of School Relations has seven full-time recruiters who travel to about 400 high schools a year, Assistant Director Holly Musick said. The Texas A&M recruiters give presentations along with recruiters from other universities in programs organized by the Texas Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.

"All of us travel 75 percent of the time during the fall semester," she said.

Musick said Texas A&M recruiters mainly stress academics and the quality of the University.

"We only recruit (in) Texas schools because we are a state-supported institution," Musick said. "Sometimes we go to a few places on the borders of Texas,

but that is funded by the Former Students Association."

Texas A&M recruiters don't use hard-sell techniques because there is enough interest in Texas A&M that students come to them with questions, she said.

The recruiters visit mainly with high school juniors and seniors. Musick said they try to talk to juniors before they take the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

"The main thing I encourage the students to do is visit the campus and get their own impressions of what A&M is like," Musick said.

Recruiters present a slide show on campus life and talk about academics, admission requirements, housing, and financial aid, followed by a question-and-answer session.

"A number of times students will visit the campus and they will recognize me as the one who gave them a presentation and they say they came because of what I told them," Musick said. During spring, the recruiters

visit junior colleges and work on recruiting scholarship students, in addition to giving campus tours to students and their families.

University of Houston uses alumni as volunteer recruiters, in addition to three full-time recruiters, Ann Rece, acting assistant director of admissions at the University of Houston, said.

"They are most helpful because they have the perspective of the student," Rece said.

The associate and assistant directors of admissions at Rice University do the recruiting, Joan Butcher, an admissions office employee at Rice University, said.

"We try to get mostly to the larger schools that we feel have appropriate applicants," she said. "We also send out letters of congratulations to students who do extremely well on their SAT scores and ask them if they might think about coming to Rice."
