

Girl Scout camp needs volunteers for one weekend

Thirty-two Aggie volunteers are needed to assist camp leaders with about 350 girls at Girl Scout Camp Howdy. The girls, in the first through the sixth grades, will attend the camp, two miles west of Bryan, on May 31 and June 1.

Diana Elder, publicity chairman of the Day Camp Executive Council, said volunteers must enjoy working with children and the outdoors. Previous experience in the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts is also desired.

"If we don't have enough adult supervision, we will have to turn away some of the girls who have applied," she said. Two volunteers are needed to assist each of the 16 group leaders. Volunteers can work for a portion of the camp session if they cannot work for the whole session. A free nursery will be provided for the children of volunteers, Elder said. "Gift of Water" is the theme for this camp session. Camp

staff will focus all activities and crafts on water conservation, resources and uses, she said.

"They'll learn to appreciate water and how important it is to conserve it," she said.

Each group will compete to see which can conserve the most water during the session, she said. The groups each will be assigned a project related to the water theme and each group will research a project about the importance and processes of water.

One of the water projects will be to make terrariums to teach campers about photosynthesis and the water cycle.

Consultants from Texas A&M University will instruct the campers on several subjects including environmental interpretation and seafood technology.

Financial assistance is available for campers who need it. Application forms for the camp are available from the Girl Scouts or from Marie Bell at 846-0057.

Students promote agriculture

Six Texas A&M students in the College of Agriculture are spreading the message of agriculture through speeches on leadership, motivation, young people in agriculture and the importance of America's food and fiber industry.

The students are Agrispeakers — part of a program, patterned partly after similar groups at other universities that started in the fall of 1980.

Most speakers in the group have been state or area Future Farmers of America officers and have considerable experience in public speaking, said Agrispeaker Randy Green, a senior agri-

cultural journalism major.

"It (Agrispeakers) was established with the idea of creating a bureau to provide speeches on agriculture topics," Green said.

"As speakers, we try to give a good speech, make people think about the topic, as well as boost the image of the University. We hope that as Texas A&M students in the College of Agriculture we have something worthwhile to say.

"We are more than motivators and cheerers-on; we try to put meat in our talks and tell people the real concerns in agriculture.

"In many towns ... there are a lot of people who don't know where their food comes from.

We hope to educate them and make them more aware of agriculture. We meet a lot of very nice people."

Agrispeakers don't participate in the program for the money, Green said.

"There is a mileage fee, which

is the same state employees receive, and a small speaking fee," he said. "This isn't much after you think of the time spent writing and practicing the speech, time on the road, and delivery."

Dr. Herman Brown, profes-

or of agricultural education, is the group's adviser.

Agrispeakers are available to speak to FFA and other school groups, 4-H clubs, business and farm groups, civic clubs and other organizations.

Pay raises, grants on council agenda

College Station City Council members discussed across-the-board pay raises in a work session Wednesday night and will formally present the idea at tonight's public hearing.

The meeting will start at 7 p.m. in the council chambers.

The proposed pay increases, which will range from 6 percent to 8 percent, are designed to compensate employees for cost-of-living increases, councilman Tony Jones said.

In addition, a public hearing to discuss how to use the \$317,000 community development grant will be held.

Tentative figures authorize \$180,000 for housing rehabilitation in the form of direct grants and loan subsidies.

Other tentative costs include \$90,000 for street improvements, \$21,000 for the rehabilitation of rental properties and the balance for a contingency fund.

In other business, the council will consider an ordinance allowing Wood Energy to drill an oil well on city property. The proposed site for the well is in the University Park subdivision north of the Fedmart shopping center.
