Utah powerhouses next

Aggies split pair with Bearkats

Shan McDonald pitched her first loss of the season for the Texas Aggie softball team Tuesday as the Aggies split a double-header with Sam Houston State at Travis Park. Texas A&M won the first game 5-0 and lost the finale 3-0.

Coach Bob Brock sees the loss, the Aggies' second this season to Bearkat pitcher Val Greenwall, as no lasting problem.

"I think we had a few little problems defensively," he said. "Then Shan kind of hung the ball up, and we just didn't get runs when we needed it."

"I don't think there will be any mental block. We have in the past beaten her (Greenwall) most of the time."

There were certainly no mental problems in the first game, as the Aggies rode to a 5-0 shutout on the strength of Lori Stoll's two-hitter.

In fact, Karen Guerrero could give lessons in concentrated, timely ballplaying. The right fielder had two hits, two runs, one RBI and an on-the-run catch that Brock described as "unbelievable."

Bearkat pitcher Terri Young led off the game by hitting Guerrero with a pitch. Shannon Murray advanced her to second with a single, and Josie Carter put runners on second and third on a fielder's choice.

A grounder to shortstop from Iva Jackson scored Murray and Guerrero for a 2-0 Aggie lead.

In the fifth inning, Guerrero again reached base, this time on

a single, and stole second base to set up Texas A&M's third run. Murray singled to put runners at first and third base, and Mary Lou Youngblood scored Guerrero with a sacrifice fly.

A double steal in the sixth inning by Carrie Austgen and Patti Holthaus, who had reached base on a walk and a single, set up the Aggies' final scores. A single up the middle, again from Guerrero, accounted for the Aggies last two runs.

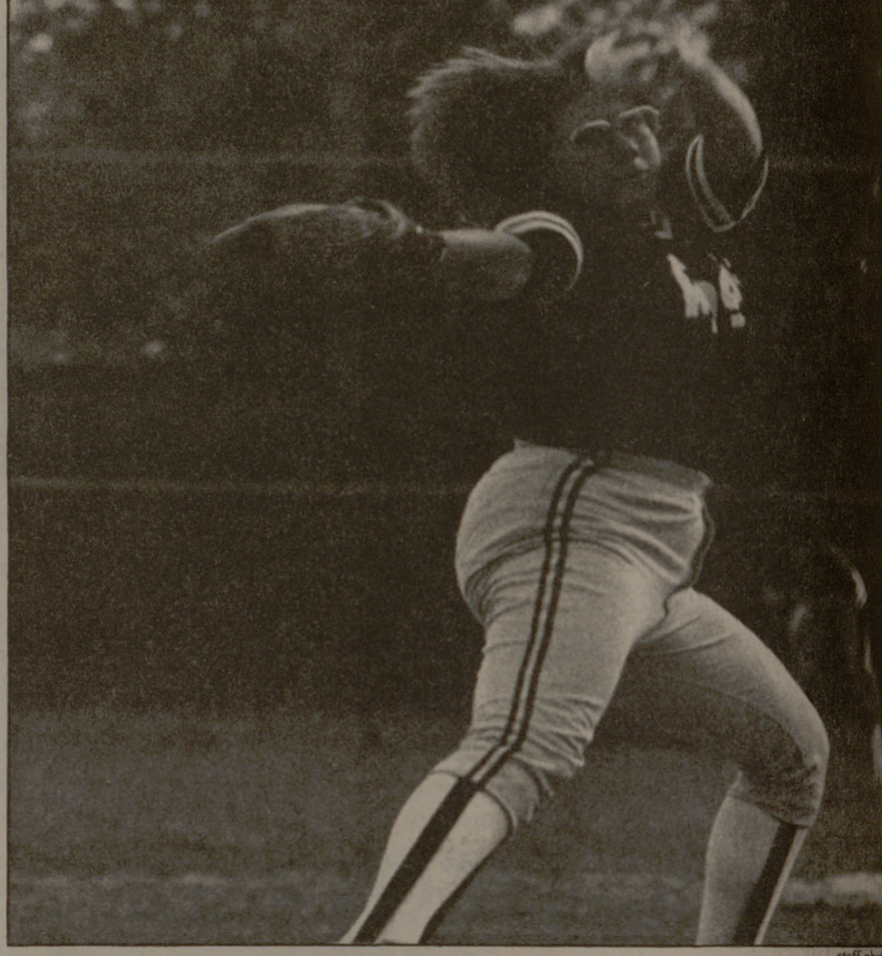
The victory, which assistant coach Sue Lilley said was one of Stoll's best efforts, upped the pitcher's record to 16-4.

In the second game, the Bearkats put together a three-run fourth inning to blank the Aggies 3-0 and knock McDonald, now 15-1, from the ranks of the unbeaten. A pair of Aggie errors allowed Sam Houston to load the bases, and a double scored all three runs.

The split with the Bearkats drops the Aggies, ranked fourth in the nation, to 33-5 for the season. They leave for Utah Thursday to play three double-headers, the remnants of what was supposed to be the Utah State Invitational Tournament.

Brock said the road trip should be a "good test" for his team, since two of Texas A&M's three opponents are of top ten caliber. The University of Utah has beaten several top ten teams, including Oklahoma State, and Utah State is the top-rated team in the country.

The Aggies will face Idaho State in the other double-header.

Quarterbacks, linemen lauded by offensive coordinator Ruel

Only one workout separates the Texas Aggie football team from Saturday's first annual alumni game, "scheduled" for Kyle Field at 6 p.m.

Spring training's 18th practice, held Tuesday afternoon, left only today's full-contact scrimmage as the final tune-up for the alumni contest. In fact, the Aggies' scrimmage at 4 this afternoon will be the last real tune-up for the team before it begins two-a-day workouts in August.

Coach Jackie Sherrill and his assistants agree that a great deal of progress has been made during five weeks of spring practice. Offensive coordinator Pat Ruel said perhaps the greatest improvements among members of his front line have been made by freshman center Matt Darwin, junior tackle Bryan Dausin and freshman guard Greg Porter.

Porter, a 6-4, 240-pounder

from Humble, has moved into one of the starting guard positions after having been second string during the 1981 season. Ruel said that Dausin has shown himself to be a "very coachable player who works hard on fundamentals."

Quarterbacks Gary Kubiak, John Elkins and Marvin Wesley received praise from Ruel, who said that the three have learned to read defenses better throughout the spring workouts. The coach added that Kubiak has proven that he can be a "great field general."

The Texas A&M coaching staff expresses hope that the alumni game will set an attendance record for a spring game. The record, set by Notre Dame, stands at 35,000.

Students with a current Texas A&M I.D. will be admitted to Saturday's alumni game free, while tickets for non-student

adults are on sale in G. Rollie White Coliseum for \$5. Tickets younger are \$2.

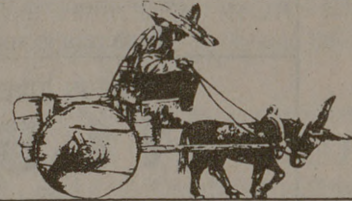
Los Angeles totally dominated the backboards, building a 55-38 advantage, while blocking 10 shots to just the Suns.
