

Evinrude heiress abducted, killed in \$100 robbery

STUART, Fla. — The heiress to the Evinrude outboard-motor fortune promised her parents she was working her last overnight shift at a convenience store — the lonely hours frightened her.

But Frances Julia Slater, 18, never finished the shift. The granddaughter of a millionaire was abducted and killed Tuesday in a \$100 holdup.

An autopsy was to be performed Wednesday, but authorities said she appeared to have been stabbed in the neck.

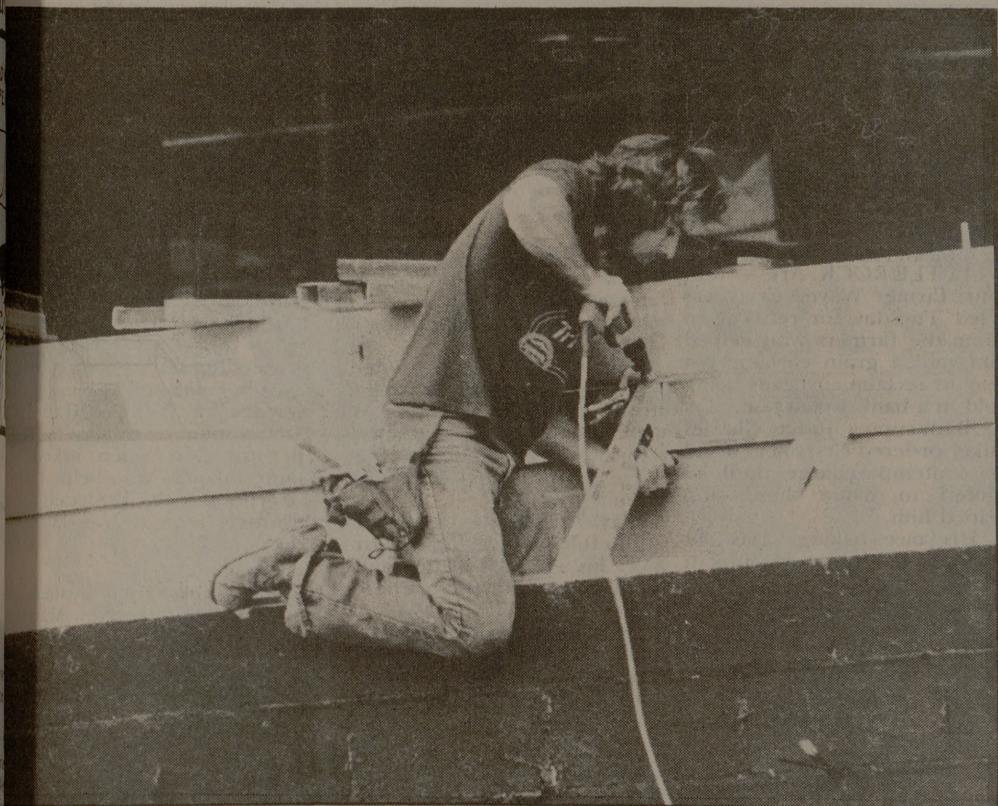
Investigators said they were looking for a large old white car with four passengers seen at the Lil General store around 2:45 a.m. Tuesday.

A customer stopped at the store at 3 a.m. to buy a pack of cigarettes and found no one there.

"There were no signs of a struggle but her purse, keys and car were still there and we know she was forcibly taken from the store," said Stuart Police Sgt. Joanne Waldron. "The cash re-

gister was cleaned out."

The granddaughter of multi-millionaire, outboard-motor manufacturer Ralph Evinrude and retired actress Frances Langford was found by a man driving a tractor down a road about 12 miles from the store.



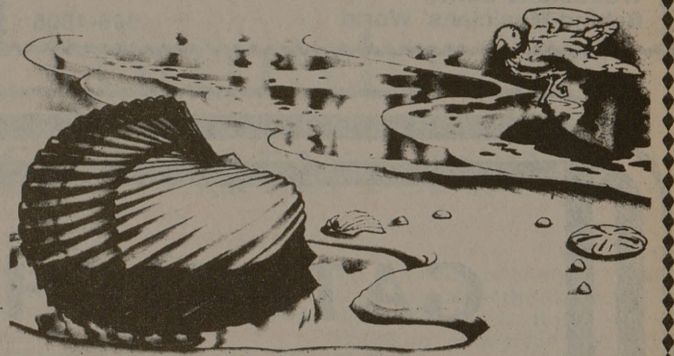

Allbritton, NY News talks off

NEW YORK — The Tribune Co. of Chicago announced Wednesday that it has cancelled its agreement with Texas financier Joe Allbritton for the sale of the New York Daily News, one of the nation's largest-circulation general interest daily newspapers.

Allbritton Communications and the Tribune Co. have terminated all discussion concerning the sale of the New York Daily News to Allbritton Communications," Stanton R. Cook, president of the Tribune Co., said.

"The Daily News has asked to meet with the Allied Printing Trades Council on Friday, April 30, 1982, at 2 p.m.," Cook said, adding there would be no additional comment before that meeting.

The announcement came two days after the Tribune Co. extended by five days Allbritton's option to purchase the paper, setting a new deadline of May 5 for an agreement.

There was no immediate explanation from any of the parties concerned as to why the negotiations were canceled.

Allbritton's negotiators had tried to reach agreement on layoffs with the 11 unions that represent workers at the Daily News, which the Tribune Co. put up for sale last December.

Accountants for the unions had received the financial information they had requested from Allbritton before resuming negotiations on the prospective sale.

The unions said they needed the information in order to negotiate on job cuts and concessions the Texas millionaire has said are necessary before he can purchase the Daily News.

Gardner was charged with second-degree grand larceny.
