
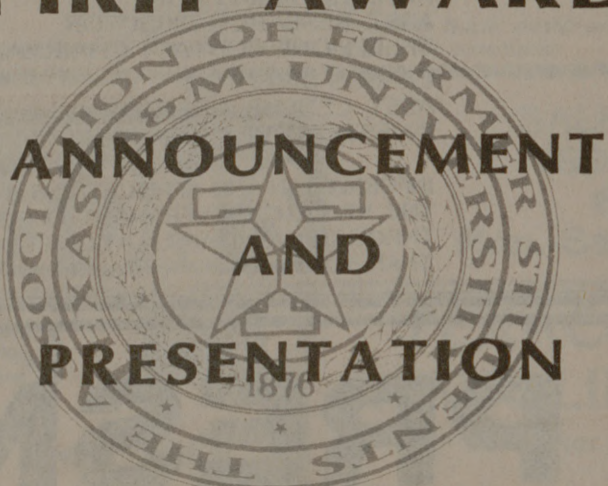

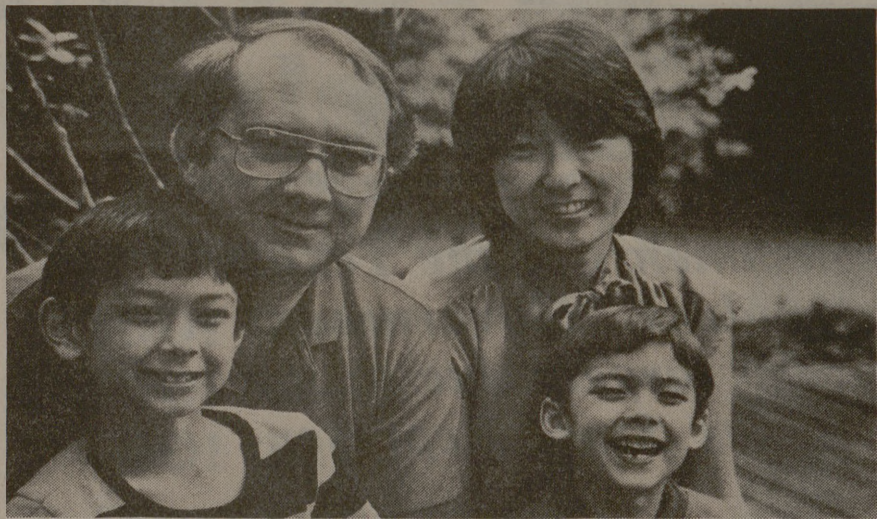

## Farmer won't talk, jailed in grain raid

 LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Missouri farmer Wayne Cryts was jailed Tuesday for refusing to name the farmers who helped him raid a grain elevator last year to reclaim soybeans being held in a bankruptcy case.

Bankruptcy Judge Charles Baker ordered Cryts held in jail on contempt charge until he agreed to name those who helped him.

His voice shaking, Cryts told Baker, "Your honor, I cannot in good conscience to myself answer any questions. I'm not doing this to be contemptible. I feel I've been denied my basic rights and freedoms."

The judge told the bailiff,

"You bring him (Cryts) back when he says he's ready to answer questions. The man is in civil contempt for refusing to answer questions."

Earlier this month, a federal judge granted Cryts immunity from criminal action if he agreed to answer the questions. However, Cryts' fellow farmers were not protected by the immunity offer.

Cryts' face flushed as he stood up to follow the bailiff, looking over his shoulder at his family for a long moment before he left the courtroom.

About 30 farmers, most of them wearing American Agriculture movement caps, were standing outside on the court-

house steps in support of Cryts. Federal judges have power, one farmer can lock up farmers order it sold in a proceeding.

## Huge dosage increase aids cancer treatment

 CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — A huge increase in the dosage of a standard medication for the common form of adult leukemia can more than triple the disease's remission rate, cancer researchers say.

Dr. Robert L. Capizzi, professor of medicine and pharmacology at the University of North Carolina's Cancer Research Center, said Tuesday that clinical trials with the treatment — a combination of drugs derived in part from sea sponges in dosages 30 times higher than usual

— brought about remission in 15 patients who had failed all other types of treatment.

In 14 other patients who had just been diagnosed with acute myelocytic leukemia, he said, 12 went into remission and the other two died before the treatment had time to take effect.

"These results are significantly superior to those achieved by standard treatments for several reasons," said Capizzi, who released his results in St. Louis at the annual meeting of the Society of Clinical Oncology. "Most importantly, it's be-

cause the drugs have a higher capacity to penetrate the natural barriers between the blood stream and central nervous system."

Acute myelocytic leukemia is the most common leukemia in adults, and bone marrow starts to produce an uncontrolled number of immature white blood cells.

Capizzi said the old amounts of Ara-C had remissions in about 25 percent of cases. The UNC treatment had an 80 percent remission rate.

## Crash survivor: 'Pilot warned us about fog'

 FORT OGLETHORPE, Ga. — The pilot warned his passengers that Chattanooga was one of the nation's foggiest places.

Minutes later, the plane slammed into a cliff on fog-shrouded Lookout Mountain, killing six men.

Bruce Bowers, the sole survivor of the crash, said Tuesday he was thrown clear of the plane and knocked unconscious. When he woke up he heard the moans of two friends who lay dying in the wreckage of the corporate plane.

"I'm just lucky to be alive," Bowers said, a week after the twin-engine plane crashed while on its way to Fort Payne, Ala.

"There was another pilot in the seat beside me who didn't make it."

"The pilot had said Chattanooga was one of the foggiest places in the United States. The weather was bad and we were going to drive to Fort Payne."

Bowers said from his hospital bed that the crash of the Mitsubishi M-2 turboprop plane occurred swiftly and passengers had little time to react.

"Everybody just kind of gasped and looked at each other," Bowers said. "I remember anything being said. It was so quick, something the plane. I ducked, I crouched. I knew we were going to crash. I blacked out."

Five of those killed in the crash were employees of G. Bell Taggart Corp. of Dallas, including two executive vice presidents. A vice president of maker Inc. of San Diego was killed.

The crash occurred about 10 miles south of Chattanooga, Lookout Mountain, Ga.
