The project's name was changed in October from the Lyric Theater to the Gus S. Wortham Theater Center after the Wortham Foundation donated \$15 million, which will be paid in installments spread out

over a three-to five-year period. Construction is scheduled to begin in early 1983; completion of the structure is planned for fall 1985.

Mowery said the center will consist of two theaters — one to seat 2,300 and another for 1,100 — plus a park in front of the building. The larger theater will be for the Houston Ballet, Houston Grand Opera and traveling tours. The smaller theater will be primarily for the Society for the Performing Arts; it will be used for recitals, dance groups and chamber music.
