Hunt said Thursday that he was contacted about the position about four weeks ago. He describes his current post as a "catch-all," in which he has been able to counsel student-athletes and teach on the faculty as well.

A native of Laurel, Miss., Hunt received his bachelor's degree from Mississippi State, then earned a master's in education and a doctorate in secondary education. He served as the athletic academic counselor and head track and field coach at MSU from 1969-79, and took the position as administrative assistant for student-athlete services in 1979.


