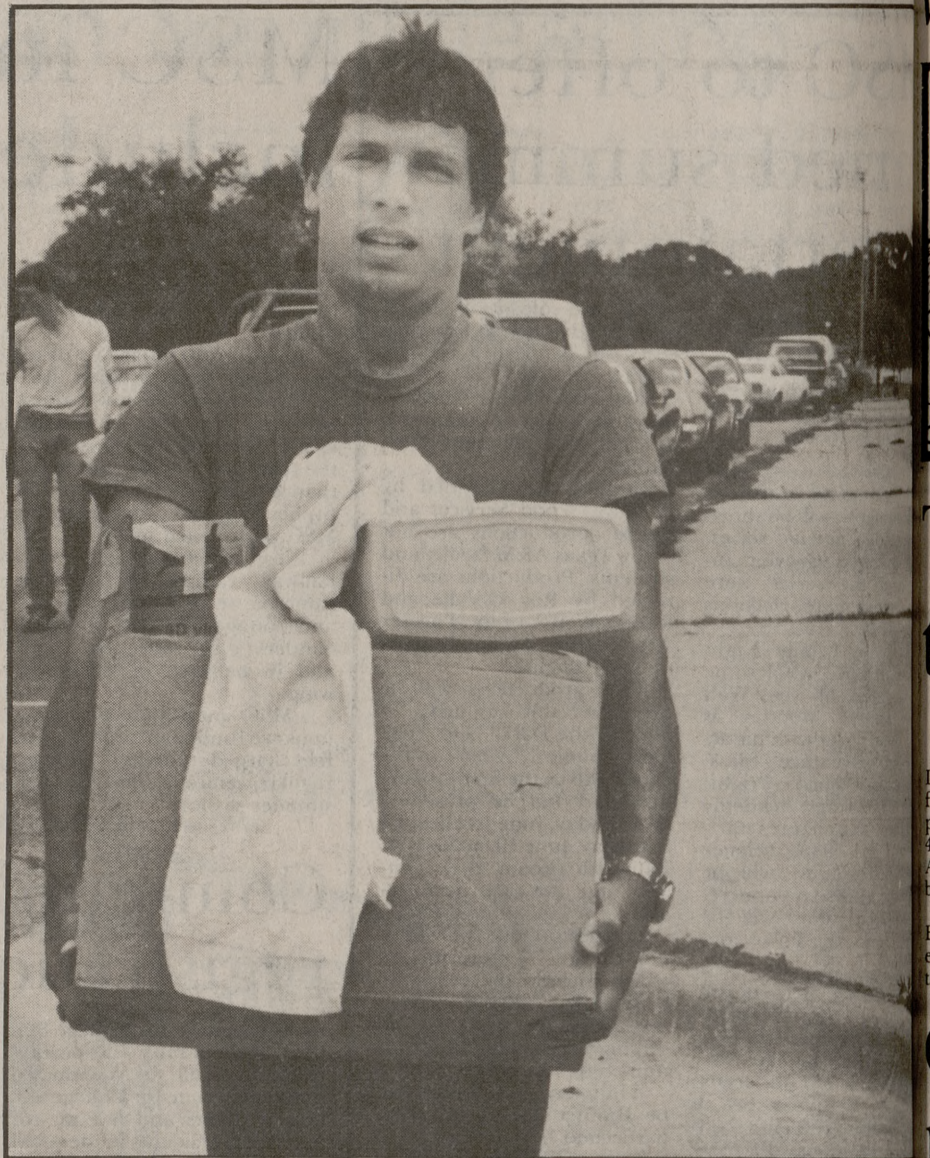

Funeral services held for two A&M students

Funeral services for Willard F. Brown, 25, and Rory G. Stahl, 22, were held Sunday and Monday. Both were killed in a motorcycle accident on campus Saturday.

Services for Brown were held Sunday in Stephenville. He was buried Monday in Windsor, Conn. Services for Stahl were held Monday in Angleton.

Brown, a senior marketing major from Stephenville, and Stahl, a junior mechanical engineering major from Angleton,

were killed when Brown attempted to turn right onto Texas Avenue from New Main Drive. He lost control of the motorcycle and crashed into a brick wall at 12:24 a.m.

University Police Chief Russ McDonald said the motorcycle, which belonged to Brown, apparently ran up on the sidewalk of the right turn lane barrier. The two students were thrown from the motorcycle. One man slammed into a corner of the brick wall which surrounds the flower bed in the barrier; the other was thrown 30 feet to the other side

of the flower bed. McDonald said both were dead from multiple and body injuries before ambulance arrived.

A witness saw the motorcycle crash into the wall and saw the motorcycle appeared to be going too fast to make the

McDonald said he thought the motorcycle was going fast for either rider to see the impact.

He said both riders were wearing helmets, but no damage was done to the helmets.

Customs officials score record heroin bust at Dallas airport

DALLAS— Authorities said a routine airport inspection led to the arrest of two Thai nationals and the seizure by U.S. Customs Service agents of 10 pounds of heroin worth an estimated \$6.5 million.

"It's one of our better busts," David Greenleaf, U.S. Customs Service Dallas District director, said late Sunday. "We'll take it as

a record for heroin."

Greenleaf said inspectors found about 25 plastic packages of heroin in three suitcases with false bottoms during the customs check at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport about 7:15 p.m. Sunday.

He said the two men, who were arrested without incident, now face smuggling and con-

spiracy charges and will appear before a federal magistrate Tuesday.

The Thai International Airlines flight arrived in Dallas out 6:45 p.m. Sunday from Bangkok, Thailand, with stops in Tokyo and Seattle, Greenleaf said.

"It was just a good, routine inspection," Greenleaf said.
