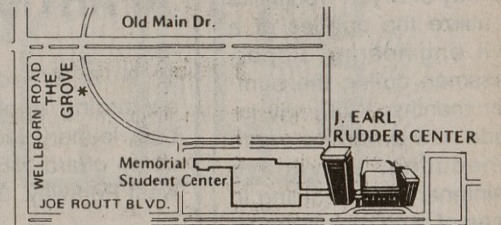

<p>June 6 SOUND OF MUSIC (1965, rated G) One of the most popular films of its time Julie Andrews stars in this story of the Von Trapp family and their attempts to escape from the Nazis. Sound of Music received the Oscar for Best Picture in 1965 and is still remembered for its excellent soundtrack.</p> 	<p>May 31 MOONRAKER (1979, rated PG) Roger Moore as 007 teams up with an American agent (Lois Chiles) to investigate the disappearance of the space shuttle Moonraker. The trail eventually leads to, where else, outer space and a spectacular space battle.</p> 	<p>June 1 10 (1979, rated R) Dudley Moore portrays a man obsessed with the most beautiful woman he has ever seen (Bo Derek, of course). He finally wins her over with unpredictable results.</p> 	<p>June 2 IT HAPPENED ONE NIGHT (1934, rated G) This movie made a name for itself in film history when it captured all four of the top Academy Awards. Clark Gable and Claudette Colbert star in this romantic comedy about a newspaperman and a heiress who travel across the country together. Frank Capra directed this classic film.</p> 	<p>June 3 EXCALIBUR (1981, rated R) The enduring legend of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table is the inspiration for Excalibur. Director John Boorman creates a film that exquisitely portrays both the lustiness and the romance of the Arthurian tales. Nicol Williamson is especially effective as the whimsical yet worldly Merlin.</p> 	<p>June 4-5 ARTHUR (1981, rated PG) Dudley Moore is funnier than ever as a lovable playboy who falls for a shoplifter, portrayed by Liz Minnelli. John Gage had won an Academy Award for his supporting role as Arthur's disdainful but devoted valet, Hobson. The comedy hit of '81.</p> 
<p>June 13 OH GOD! (1977, rated PG) George Burns and John Denver are wonderful together as God and an unsuspecting supermarket manager through whom God addresses mankind. Carl Reiner directs the heartwarming comedy.</p> 	<p>June 7 DR. NO (1962, unrated) Sean Connery, in the first of the Bond series, tries to stop the fiendish Dr. No from taking over the world from his private Jamaican island. The first lovely Bond lady is played by Ursula Andress.</p> 	<p>June 8 YOUNG FRANKENSTEIN (1975, rated PG) Baron von Frankenstein's grandson Victor (Gene Wilder) takes up where his grandfather left off and creates a new creature. But this one is a bit different from the original monster in this hilarious Mel Brooks hit.</p> 	<p>June 9 CASABLANCA (1943, rated G) The movie that has been most affectionately imitated throughout the years won Best Picture in 1943. Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman star in this greatest of screen romances.</p> 	<p>June 10 DRAGONSLAYER (1981, rated PG) A sorcerer's young apprentice (Peter MacNicol) must save a Middle Ages English village from the evil red dragon Grimmlath Pygmytwe. You'll believe in flying, fire-breathing dragons after this film.</p> 	<p>June 11-12 STRIPES (1981, rated R) Bill Murray becomes the military's most unlikely hero when he decides to get his life together by joining the Army. He is joined in his escapades by his fellow enlistees, including John Candy from SCTV.</p> 
<p>June 20 THE MUPPET MOVIE (1979, rated G) Kermit the Frog heads for Hollywood, meeting Miss Piggy and a host of others along the way. Jim Henson, the creator of the Muppets, successfully brings the magic of the Muppets to the big screen. A delight for young and old alike.</p> 	<p>June 14 FROM RUSSIA WITH LOVE (1963, unrated) The first and only Bond movie to attempt a serious love story. Sean Connery as Bond must find a missing decoding machine while avoiding Russian agents.</p> 	<p>June 15 RICHARD PRYOR LIVE IN CONCERT (1979, rated R) The uncensored version of Pryor's 1978 concert tour, which introduced American public to his style and bawdy humor.</p> 	<p>June 16 GONE WITH THE WIND (1939, rated G) This film received the Academy Award for Best Picture and has continued to be the most popular film of all time. Clark Gable and Vivien Leigh star in this epic Civil War romance which presents a host of other remarkable performances, including Leslie Howard and Olivia de Havilland. The film that started the Bond craze.</p> 	<p>June 22 RETURN OF THE PINK PANTHER (1975, rated PG) Peter Sellers, as the untiring Inspector Clouseau, bumbles his way in search of the Pink Panther diamond, tripping over his own feet most of the way.</p> 	<p>June 23 ON THE WATERFRONT (1954, rated G) Elio Kazan won an Oscar for his direction and Marlon Brando won for his acting in this Best Picture of 1954. Brando's shattering performance is among the finest ever recorded on film.</p> 	<p>June 24 HEAVEN CAN WAIT (1978, rated PG) When Warren Beatty (Warren Beatty) gets called to Heaven too soon by an overzealous angel, he demands to be returned. He is, but not in his original form. Confusing co-stars Julie Christie, Charles Grodin, and Dyan Cannon.</p> 	<p>June 25-26 AIRPLANE! (1980, rated R) Brought to you by the people who created Kentucky Fried Movie, Airplane! maintains its tradition of zany irreverent humor. With a cast including Robert Conard and Leslie Nielsen, Airplane! spoofs the Airport movies of the seventies.</p>

Magnificent scenes, including the famous chariot race, are a result of William Wyler's breathtaking direction.</p> 	<p>July 8 ALIEN (1979, rated R) The now famous alien progresses from face-hugging to chest-bursting to full grown stages as it invades the space freighter Nostromo and attacks the crew of seven (including Tom Skerritt, Sigourney Weaver, and Ian Holm).</p> 	<p>July 9-10 TIME BANDITS (1981, rated PG) They're six renegade dwarfs-rebels against their Supreme Being and their jobs in the Trees and Small Shrubs Department who've stolen the secret map of the universe's time holes. One night, they crash through the closet of an 11-year-old boy's room and decide to take him on their fantastic travels. Time Bandits blossomed from the fertile comic minds of Monty Python's Terry Gilliam, who also directed and Michael Palin, who also stars.</p> 
<p>July 11 CAMELOT (1967, rated G) Richard Harris and Vanessa Redgrave star as Arthur and Guenevere in this superb version of the Broadway Lerner and Loewe musical. The legends of King Arthur come to life in this lovely and romantic film.</p> 	<p>July 12 YOU ONLY LIVE TWICE (1967, unrated) Spectre strikes again, hijacking a manned space flight and threatening nuclear war. Sean Connery as 007 uses his portable helicopter to try to save the world in a spectacular air battle.</p> 	<p>July 13 ANIMAL HOUSE (1978, rated R) John Belushi leads his unorthodox fraternity brothers in a fight against the sophisticated Omegas with wild and crazy results.</p> 	<p>July 14 PATTON (1970, rated PG) George C. Scott will always be remembered for his portrayal of the tough, gutsy general. He received an Academy Award for his stunning performance in this film which ranks as one of the greatest war movies ever produced.</p> 	<p>July 15 A CLOCKWORK ORANGE (1971, rated R) Stanley Kubrick's classic film about Alex (Malcolm McDowell), a young man whose favorite hobbies are Beethoven and ultra-violence. When he is finally caught, an experimental form of rehabilitation is used with interesting results.</p> 	<p>July 16-17 CADDYSHACK (1980, rated R) This movie takes a wild irreverent swing at country club life. Bill Murray and Chevy Chase display the humor that made their Saturday Night Live stints so successful. Rodney Dangerfield gets no respect, but lots of laughs in this hilarious comedy.</p> 
<p>July 18 THE GOODBYE GIRL (1977, rated G) Her Simon's most successful screen effort stars Richard Dreyfuss and Marsha Mason. The pair are delightful together as a chorus girl and an actor who both make claims for the same apartment. Their confrontations make for a witty romantic comedy.</p> 	<p>July 19 DIAMONDS ARE FOREVER (1971, rated PG) Sean Connery, in his last Bond film, teams up with Jill St. John to fight the infamous Blofeld, who is smuggling diamonds. Bond's newest gadget is a special heat seeking rocket.</p> 	<p>July 20 BLAZING SADDLES (1974, rated R) Gene Wilder plays a famous gunfighter who takes up with the sheriff of Rockridge, Clavon Little, to save the town from Mel Brooks and Harvey Korman. The ending is certainly not your run-of-the-mill Western ending.</p> 	<p>July 21 FRENCH CONNECTION (1971, rated R) This exciting film boasts the superb talents of Gene Hackman and Roy Scheider, as well as one of the most thrilling chase scenes on film. One of the first and the best of the "tough cop" films that were so prolific in the seventies.</p> 	<p>July 22 STAR TREK — THE MOTION PICTURE (1979, rated G) William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy and DeForest Kelley as Kirk, Spock and McCoy race to save the Earth from a mysterious destroyer of ships and space stations. The rest of the Enterprise crew is aboard, along with a couple of new additions (Stephen Collins and Persis Khambatta).</p> 	<p>July 23-24 BODY HEAT (1981, rated R) Captures the svelte-sexy style of the movies of the forties. William Hurt, one of America's hottest new actors, becomes involved with a mysterious young woman, played bewitchingly by newcomer Kathleen Turner. Together they plot to murder her wealthy husband. The plot twists and turns as we watch Hurt fall deeper and deeper into the intrigue that follows this mysterious woman.</p> 
<p>July 25 DUMBO (1941, rated G) A classic Disney animation starring the world's most lovable elephant. A joy for young and old alike.</p> 	<p>July 26 LIVE AND LET DIE (1973, rated PG) In his first appearance as James Bond, Roger Moore tries to stop a drug ring, concealed behind a mask of voodoo and the occult. He also finds Jane Seymour as Solitaire, the gorgeous consort of the villain.</p> 	<p>July 27 LIFE OF BRIAN (1979, rated R) Monty Python's film depicting Brian, who is born in a manger not far from and at the same time as Jesus Christ. The two are continually being confused, leading to typically hilarious Monty Python circumstances.</p> 	<p>July 28 GODFATHER (1972, rated R) Francis Ford Coppola brilliantly directed this greatest of gangster movies. Marlon Brando won an Academy Award for his superb performance as the aging head of a powerful Mafia clan. Al Pacino, James Caan, and Robert Davari are part of the star-studded supporting cast.</p> 	<p>July 29 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY (1968, rated G) Stanley Kubrick traces the technological development of man and his inability to cope with it, with space as the background. The film that began the current science fiction craze.</p> 	<p>July 30-31 CAT PEOPLE (1982, rated R) The director of American Gigolo has created an erotic, eerie horror film in CAT PEOPLE. Nastassia Kinski and Malcolm McDowell star as a brother and sister whose sexual passions can transform them into killer cats. A beautifully terrifying film with John Heard and Annette O'Toole.</p> 
<p>August 1 THE BLACK STALLION (1979, rated G) A stunning, exciting, movie experience for "hempers of any age. Francis Ford Coppola has brought the classic story of a young boy and a beautiful Arabian Stallion to the screen in a truly spectacular style. The cinematography is mesmerizing.</p> 	<p>August 2 THE MAN WITH THE GOLDEN GUN (1974, rated PG) Not only must 007 (Roger Moore) battle Christopher Lee, the arch-villain, for possession of a powerful and deadly weapon, he must also evade the world's deadliest assassin. Also starring Maude Adams and Britt Eickland.</p> 	<p>August 3 M*A*S*H (1970, rated R) Donald Sutherland and Elliot Gould, as Hawkeye and Trapper John, turn the camp upside down with their unorthodox behavior. The film ends with a hysterical football game between the 4077th and another unit.</p> 	<p>August 4 THE STING (1973, rated PG) This slick rollicking comedy walked away with seven Oscars in 1973. It has become popular ever since as one of the most entertaining films of history. Paul Newman and Robert Redford are wonderful as a pair of Depression-era con men attempting to vindicate a friend's death. The priest must expel the demon before it kills the child. It also marks the first appearance of Jaws, the most popular villain since Darth Vader.</p> 	<p>August 10 DUCK SOUP (1933, rated G) One of the most famous Marx Brothers movies, it marked the climax of their career.
