Faculty representatives of the ine SWC schools Tuesday ted to sponsor seven women's orts and championships along th the nine men's sports.

The sports include basketill, volleyball, outdoor track, indoor track, cross country, wimming and tennis beginning in the 1982-1983 school year. A ports were not added because ess than the required six schools adicated they would partici-

Women at SWC schools preously had competed under the ispices of the AIAW, but the ganization is being disbanded. SWC representatives also ted to experiment again with a sketball shot clock. The conrence plans to experiment th a 45-second shot clock for l but the last five minutes of

conference games and in nonconference games when oppo-

was the first college conference to try the shot clock but did not permanently institute it.

SWC officials also restored a year of eligibility to Houston 7-footer Akeem "The Dream" Abdul Olajuwon, a center from Lagos, Nigeria, who was a factor in the Cougars' rise to the NCAA semifinals.

Houston said Olajuwon prac ticed only 15 minutes in the fall of 1979 before he formally joined the basketball team. The NCAA ruled it a minor infraction and the SWC voted to allow Olajuwon three more seasons of eligibility.


